#### STURT V. GLENELG.

The return match between these clubs took place on the Glenelg Oval on Saturday afternoon in the presence of a very good attendance. Hanley captained the Bays, and Golding skippered the Sturts. Mr. Johnstone was central umpire. There was a moderate breeze from the north. Sturt kicked towards the south. At the start of the game Glenelg opened the attack, but the visitors returned, and Lyne had a long shot for goal, but it went wide. Lyne again marked, and a strong kick was marked splendidly in front by Golding, who scored full points without difficulty. Sturt again attacked, but the gold-and-black's staved off the onrush, and Gates was responsible for sending the ball well out of the danger zone. Smith, playing a fine game, continued the good work. Perry marked and passed to Hillier, who, in turn, passed to Farrelly, but the latter's shot went out of bounds. Returned. Golding got a free, but a long shot resulted only in a behind. Back again, and Hanley passed to Murdoch, who snapped a goal for the home side. Sturt then made a vigorous onslaught on their opponents' citadel, but Gates was equal to the occasion, and stopped and returned. Sturt, however, were not to be denied, and Odgers passing to Barron the latter secured full points from a fine drop kick. Then a minor was scored by Whitehead, after which Odgers, from a mark, snapped third goal for the two-blues. Fast play followed on the eastern wing, in which the Bays showed much improved form. Then Lyne marked in front of goal, but succeeded only in kicking the ball out of bounds. Glenelg returned, mainly through the efforts of Barnett, and from a scrimmage Hanley scored the maximum for the seashiders. Returned. Golding scored an easy goal, owing to the goalkeeper missing the leather; and almost immediately O. Beatty marked in front of the big sticks, and without difficulty added a major to the easterners' total. The quarter left Sturt attacking, and the board showed:—Sturt, 5.4; Glenelg, 2.0.

#### —Glenelg Forced the Pace.—

Sturt attacked on the opening of the second term, and Whitehead scored a point. A second onrush was warded off by Thomas, and Kappler saved by a fine mark and forwarded well down the centre. Good play by Grealey and Hanley resulted in Farrelly marking and scoring a major by a fine kick. Some ding-dong play on the pavilion wing followed, out of which Golding marked, but failed to score. Glenelg's forwards asserted themselves and, owing to a free, Grealey put the ball well through the big sticks. Murdoch, also playing a fine game, tried for goal, but it merely resulted in a single point being registered. Farrelly marked and forwarded, and Hanley from a free caused both flags to be raised. Glenelg was now playing a fine game, and continued a spirited attack, but at length the Sturts' back lines prevailed, and the pressure was relieved. Glenelg, however, prevailed, and were making the pace particularly hot, when the bell rang for half-time, when the score stood:—Sturt, 5.8; Glenelg, 5.

#### —Strenuous Play.—

The third quarter opened with a further attack by Glenelg, and Barnett, marking on the western wing, passed to Hanley, who scored full points. The two-blues forced the game on the bounce, but the seashiders were again in the ascendant, and Hanley, Grealey, and Farrelly were prominent in the work. Then Stopford passed to Barnett, who, in turn, passed to Murdoch, and the latter from a splendid angle kick placed Glenelg in the lead. Returned. Nicolle was given a free in front of goal, and scored the maximum. Sturt made a spirited attack on the gold-and-black's citadel, and Whitehead marked near goal, but kicked low, and nothing came of it. Barron also tried to snap a goal, but managed only a single point. O. Beatty then marked well in front, and caused the two flags to be wagged. A further attack gave Sanders a good chance, but he muffed it, and Gates, by good play, returned. The Sturt forwards, however, proved too quick, and Barron from a mark added the eighth goal to the Unley citizens' score. Fine play by Barnett and Grealey resulted in a behind being added for Glenelg. The two-blues next made a determined attack on the Bays' headquarters, but mainly owing to Conlin and Kappler, who were playing vigorously and determinedly, several onslaughts failed. The leather was returned, and at the end of the quarter the Glenelgs were making an attack with fairly good success. When the bell rang the scores were:—Sturt, 8.10; Glenelg, 7.1.

#### —Sturt on Their Mettle.—

The last lap opened with a forward rush by Sturt, but the seaside backs proved equal to the occasion, and the ball being returned Hanley tried a snap, but failed. Returned. Thomas saved, and Smith sent the ball well out of the danger zone, but Sturt again asserted themselves, and Baker, from a snap, registered a further maximum for the visitors. Thomas, in goal, was again responsible for several good saves. Glenelg's backs now staved off the attack, and some fine play followed. Conlin, Gates, Marshall, and Farrelly all being in the picture. Hanley, too, was rendering fine service, and the honours of the game were about equal. Then, by some clever hand passing, Sturt cleared the attack and Nicolle by a lucky shot added another goal for Sturt. Returned. Murdoch tried, but the ball hit a post. Hawkes, however, was more successful, and a well-directed kick caused the two flags to be waved for the Bays. Back again, and Lyne from a running shot did the trick for the two blues, and O. Beatty, marking right over the heads of his opponents, followed with a second major. As the bell rang Glenelg were attacking, and the game ended:—Sturt, 12.10; Glenelg, 8.3.
