NORWOOD V. GLENELG.

There was an attendance of between 3,000 and 4,000 people at the Glenelg Oval on Saturday afternoon, when the recently-formed Glenelg football team met the Norwoods for the first time. Norwood were without the services of their captain, S. White, who was absent on account of an attack of influenza, and B. A. Scott, the vice-captain, skippered the team. In the seaside 18 T. G. Barnett replaced Martin, and Jack Hanley was captain. Mr. Raven was the central umpire, and some of his decisions were questionable. At the start of the game Norwood carried the ball to their opponents' territory, where Bryant passed to Hart, who, however, failed to take advantage of the opportunity, and merely scored a point. For some little time the red-and-blues prevailed, having a decided advantage over their opponents in the air, in which department, however, Hanley frustrated many of the visitors' efforts. Then the scene of the game was shifted to the Norwood's goal, but their back line was equal to the strain, and quickly returned, and Hart, marking close in goal, secured the first major for the easterners. Shortly afterwards he secured another mark close in goal, and again registered a six-pointer. Then he added a third goal from a further mark, and a minute or so afterwards kicked a fourth goal from a mark from Toovey, which he secured right in front of the sticks. Glenelg strove hard to shift the ball, but the Norwoods proved too strong for them, and a fifth goal was credited to the visitors' total from the boot of Schumacher. Bryant's work for the red-and-blues was here very pronounced, and Potts, Stephens, and Hart also rendered good service. When the bell rang at the finish of the first term the board showed:—Norwood, 5.5; Glenelg, nil.

—A Glenelg Rally.—

At the start of the second quarter Glenelg rushed the ball down, and Farrelly marking from Barnett, kicked the first goal for the gold-and-blacks. Norwoods returned, but the home team were not to be denied, and, principally owing to the efforts of Farrelly and Hawkes, the leather was returned, and Grealy kicked a magnificent long-distance goal. Glenelg's forwards were now putting in some splendid work, Grealy and Hawkes being specially noticeable, while Hanley was proving a tower of strength to his side. Perry also did some fine work, and it was in a large measure due to his work and Hanley's that Hawkes was able to kick third goal for the seashiders. Returned, Toovey was given a free just in front of goal, and he added another major to the easterners' total. Glenelg returned, but owing to several frees being given against them, the Norwoods got the advantage, and Hart placed the ball safely between the uprights. A fine piece of work on the part of Grealy resulted in that active little player kicking

a major. The leather was once more returned, and Hart obtained his sixth goal. Again the gold-and-blacks asserted themselves, and Hanley from a splendid mark kicked another goal for Glenelg. Further dingdong play followed, and just as the bell rang Farrelly registered a minor for Glenelg. The scores at half-time were:—Norwood, 8.7; Glenelg, 5.1.

—Norwood Off Again.—

The second half opened with Brenton as an absentee from the Norwood side, he having injured a knee in the first period of the game. Norwood at once forced the pace, and within a couple of minutes Close snapped a goal by means of a quick punt. Glenelg returned, and some warm centre play followed, in which Grantley, who had been playing a fine game, was prominent. Bryant marked in front of goal, but it was a poor shot, and only a minor was scored. Schumacher next tried a long shot, but failed, but Toovey was more successful, and kicked the tenth goal for the reds. Glenelg once again "put in," and by some brilliant play, in which Barnett was conspicuous, tried hard for goal, but the effort was not successful. Then Packham forwarded by a splendid boot, and Kent, marking near goal, scored a winner, a performance he repeated almost immediately afterwards. Glenelg returned, and Grealy tried, but only scored a minor. Hawkes, however, marked from Grealy, and successfully scored a full-pointer, the board at "lemons" showing:—Norwood, 12.9; Glenelg, 8.3.

—An Exciting Finish.—

Glenelg started off determinedly, and Murdoch had a long shot, but only a behind was registered. The gold-and-blacks were not to be denied, however, and a further shot by Hawkes saw the ball safely through the big sticks. Then Hart passed to Potts, who marked just in front of goal, and the latter added a further major to the Norwood total. Back again, and Grealy, marking from out of the ruck, managed to add still another goal for the home team. Norwood "put in" for all they were worth, but again Glenelg had the best of it, and another goal to a quick boot from Grealy resulted. Returned, some rough play followed, out of which Toovey marked and scored a maximum, and Hart repeated the performance a few minutes later. Then Hanley did the same for the Bays, and the game, which was a fast and very exciting one, ended with the scores as follow:—Norwood, 15.12; Glenelg, 10.5.
