Patten skippered the visiting team, and Hanley filled a similar position for the home side. Mr. Morion was central umpire, and Mesers. Gough and Wood were the boundary umpires.

Then Patten, securing a mark, passed to Wyld, but the latter only managed 1 minor . Wyld had a second try right in front of goal. Despite it being an easy sho; he failed. A third try, however, was more successful, and he had the satufaction of kicking first goal for the vasitors. Put on their mettie, the Bays made a big effort, and Marshall, marking on the eastern wing, passed to Hillier, who from a long-distance shot successfully piloted the leather through the big sticks.
