## GOALS PLENTIFUL.

### Sturt Recover Prestige.

A large crowd assembled at the Unley Oval to see Sturt and Glenelg do battle. Harvey, who was ill, was unable to strip for the seashiders, and Peizer (nineteenth man) took his place.

Odgers commenced the attack for Sturt with a free, but the ball was quickly returned, and despite the Sturt's backs' splendid attempt to save Hanley opened the scoring for Glenelg with a goal. Transferring, Sanders saw no opening and passed to Sellick, who equalised the scores. Immediately after O. Beatty had a chance from a difficult angle and scored a full-pointer. Sturt proved too good for Glenelg, and after brilliant opposition on the part of the seashiders' backs Lyne placed the ball nicely between the sticks. An attack by Glenelg did not go far, and returning Golding marked and kicked in, where Lyne picking up sent the ball through. Sturt were all over Glenelg in their marking, though play was very fast. Odgers had a fine run, and sending well down a behind was obtained. Later the same player from a wonderful kick sent up the two flags. The seashiders started to buck in, and Grealy from a short kick raised a six-pointer. Passing round the wing Farrelly with a long kick sent to Oliver, who made no mistake. At this stage Glenelg were playing strongly. The first quarter scores were:—

Glenelg commenced the second quarter with vigour. Grealy had a good shot, which just failed. Cant also had a hard kick, which sent up one flag. Sturt hammered away without avail at the Glenelg goal, where a brilliant display was given by the Glenelg backs, Marshall being especially prominent. The seashiders gradually worked the ball down, and Hawkes sent a clever goal home. Hanley took a lovely mark in front, and one flag was raised. Sturt woke up, and after some good centre play Mayman lodged a major from a long kick. The two-blues put in some fine air work, and their long kicking was a feature of the play. Glenelg, however, were giving them a run for their money. Both sides made strenuous attempts to score, but neither was successful, and the bell rang with the totals:—

After their fine showing in the second bout the seashiders looked to have at least a chance of claiming the victory, and at the beginning of the third quarter they were first to work, but the Unley men returned and handed a behind. Sanders, taking an easy mark in front, put the ball through for the double blues. Odgers kicked right in from the wing, and Golding, marking well, had a try, a behind resulting. Kappier marked in goal and cleared, but Nicolle secured and sent it back through the sticks. Glenelg were not putting up their good game of the last quarter, and Sturt went ahead, Golding scoring his first major from a great mark near the goal. Odgers sent in from the wing, and Golding from a free raised another six-pointer. Glenelg obtained, and a behind was placed, but Sturt were too strong, and after a hard struggle they returned and a goal came from Golding, followed later by one from Sanders. Glenelg made a final rally from which nothing resulted, and the quarter closed:—

The fine rally in the third quarter by Sturt had given them a good lead, and Glenelg seemed to have practically no chance at all. The Unley men were in good fettle when the last flutter commenced, and Golding led off with a behind. Whitehead was putting up a good game for Sturt, and forwarded, but Glenelg returned with a splendid spurt, and Hawkes registered his second goal. Sturt returned and O. Beatty had a difficult angle shot, which did not miss. Glenelg got into the picture again and Grealy sent a behind through. The game at this stage was more evenly contested, though Glenelg's chance was hopeless. They struggled on very gamely, however, and Cant rushed the ball through from a scrumage. Sturt immediately returned and Lyne sent up a full-pointer. Sturt quite outplayed Glenelg, and Lyne from the front of goal registered his fourth goal. Golding kicked in from the wing, and O. Beatty marking in front sent it through. Glenelg were attacking vigorously when the game ended.

## NOTES ON THE PLAY

### STURT WIN EASILY.

The match at Unley resulted in a very easy win for Sturt, though up to the end of the second quarter Glenelg were playing their best game for the season, and they looked to have a chance of victory.

The third quarter decided the contest, when the Unley men nearly doubled their score of the first half. The last period was a complete runaway for Sturt.

All the Sturt 18 played well, and their marking was far superior to that of Glenelg. Some of their kicking was unsound, and Golding, though taking some exceptionally fine marks, was not up to his usual form. Three goals were credited to him.

Odgers always got his kick, and made a really fine stand, heading many dashes.

Lyne is a player of undoubted merit, and his presence in the forward line is a great asset. He obtained four goals, besides rendering other useful service.

Sellick is a fine stamp of a player, who put up one of his best games, trucking his opponents every time, and always getting his kick.

O. Beatty was brilliant. One beautiful mark on the wing deserves mention. He also kicked strongly.

L. Smith was one of the best on the field. He invariably had the better of his opponent. Clever hand exchanges was one of the chief points in his play.

A brilliant wingman is Colquhoun, and he treated his supporters to some splendid marking. He was very sure in his kicking, and worked his way through the crushes with ease.

Glenelg showed up well in the first half, and though Sturt were superior they put up a good fight. They are developing a good combination. At present far too many men go up for the ball.

Their play is vigorous and forceful, and with a little more pace and cohesion they will be a team to be reckoned with.

Marshall is one of their best men, and he played like a champion throughout. It is very rarely his opponent beats him.

In the Glenelg back lines Gates, Perry, and Murdoch form a solid barrier. Gates was conspicuous throughout the game, and put in some clever play.

Thomas is an ideal goalkeeper, and out of goal he has to be reckoned with. His marking was of the best, and he "spoilt" Golding on more than one occasion.

Though Hanley put in some solid work he has done better.

The seashiders were strengthened by the inclusion of Hillier, who was indisposed last week, and he followed very effectively in the first quarter.

Barnett is a very persevering player, who put in some grand work during the last quarter. Cant, a newcomer, justified his inclusion, and showed up very prominently at times. He was responsible for one goal.

Grealy did some good work during the first quarter, and Murdoch, Hawkes, and Smith were also responsible for fine efforts.

Mayman, at centre, was prominent for Sturt, and Whitehead, C. Sharp, Langwood-Smith, and F. Beatty also made a good showing.
