STURT VERSUS GLENELG.

Sturt met Glenelg on the seaside oval
on Saturday. Glenelg have shown an
improvement since they were defeated by
Sturt in the first round (the scores were
20 goals 7 behinds to 7 goals 4 behinds).
Spring-like weather prevailed, and the
ground was in excellent condition. The
attendance was one of the largest seen
on the Glenelg Oval during the current
season. The teams were the same as
published. Hanley, Percival, and Ross
followed for the home side, and Sturt
relied on Whitehead, Riley, and Odgers.
Hanley won the toss, and elected that
Glenelg should kick to the southern end,
which was favored by a slight breeze.
Glenelg attacked, and secured a behind,
which was followed by a goal from Ross,
who received a penalty award near the
uprights. The Sturt defenders proved
equal to the next attack, and set the
ball on its way towards the northern
goal. Here Lyne marked along the
centre, and putting the ball on the
ground, gained the maximum. Glenelg
rallied again, and Mutton, who received
a free in the centre, passed to Hanley,
who marked in a handy position, on an
angle, and again placed the "tigers" a
goal in front. The venue of the play
was straightway transferred to the other
end, and three behinds came in quick
succession. Then O. Beatty, who received
a free a good 60 yards away from the up-
rights, placed the ball, and kicked a goal.
After a strenuous effort Sturt again
worked the ball to their end, and
Barron, to whom it was handballed
from a scrimmage, found the centre with
a left-foot snap. Glenelg were display-
ing vigor and tenacity, but the head-
work of the visitors was too much for
them. Glenelg, too, were oftentimes
