NORWOOD'S EASY VICTORY.

Beat Glenelg by Nine Goals.

Glorious weather prevailed for the opening match on the Glenelg Oval. The local team were opposed to Norwood, who suffered defeat at the hands of South on Monday. A big attendance of local and other supporters witnessed the match.

David and Wadham were not required for Glenelg, and the reserves did without the services of Sparks. The toss was won by the seashiders, who selected the northern end. Norwood made the opening dash, but Glenelg quickly rallied, and but for the instrumentality of Hepburn at back might have opened the scoring list. Norwood after this took charge, and the battle raged around the Glenelg citadel for some time. Gates, playing with dash and vigour, however, relieved the pressure, and kicking well down the home team went in and notched the opening point. The redlegs retaliated with a like amount from Townley. Before the seashiders could get the leather safely away Norwood made the best of their opportunities. Hart, picking up out of the scrumage, sent the ball through, gaining a cheap goal. Despite Norwood's sporadic dashes the "tigers" hung to it, and Parker sent up their first major from a snaphot. Norwood followed their example, Close being the scorer. Glenelg went to pieces at this period, and Hart landed home another six. Gates was doing good work for the yellow-and-blacks, who after much hard graft saw the two flags go up again from Parker. Things were evening up a trifle, although Norwood kept the play lively. Hillier, from a neat stab kick from Farrelly, had a place kick, but it fell short. Quarter-time scores:—

The second quarter opened auspiciously for the visitors, who secured a clear run. Bryant made a splendid kick right down the centre, but it went astray. Before the seashiders could oust the redlegs a point was scored. Perry brought the ball along for Glenelg, and Dyer and Marshall helped substantially. Oliver kicked in with a solid boot, but the Norwood backs were too good a combination, and once again the storm raged round Glenelg goal, resulting in a full-pointer for Close. Hillier then had a place kick, which only waved one flag. A second try achieved a similar result. Better fortune was in store for the gold-and-blacks, for Hanley marking in the crowd brought off a fine goal with a punt. Norwood's superior pace was telling on the men from Holdfast Bay. Townley kicked well down, and Close secured near goal, where he added Norwood's fifth. Glenelg made things lively after Norwood's triumph, and for some time kept the opposing backs busy. Farrelly, who had begun to wake up somewhat, drop-kicked a neat goal from the railway wing. The redlegs soon made amends, Hart being responsible this time. Fowler came into contact with Hillier at centre and was laid aside tem-

porarily. Right on the half-time bell Ackland (a B Grader of last year) dashed down the centre and snapped Norwood's seventh goal, making the tallies—

The first half showed where the seashiders were lacking—in pace. Norwood had made the best of their opportunities. They set the pace in the third bout, but the seashiders brought them to before they could go far. The visitors came again after a determined resistance. Sibley from Townley and again the two flags were hoisted for Norwood. Glenelg were soon into the picture again by Murdoch's good play, but Johns eluded his attackers, preventing any hope of scoring. The game from now on developed pace and rough play was indulged in.

Returning from a splendid attack by Norwood Glenelg rushed the ball down in a fierce and combined attack. Hutton bagged a major out of the crush, and the "tigers" hung on desperately for more. Dyer put in some grand work.

Flashing out with some brilliant dashes, however, Norwood took the lead. From out of the scrumage Clapson was awarded a free (which the crowd thought doubtful), and he had little difficulty in converting into a goal, which was closely followed by another from Hart. An exciting contest took place around the redlegs' citadel, where Mutton was doing strong work. Although the Bay men were tiring they had the better of Norwood during this term. Despite the difference in the scores considerable excitement was manifested in the closing stages. Perry, the Glenelg back man, cleared the opening attack of Norwood, but the redlegs were not to be denied. "Tom" Hart registering the maximum. The seashiders put plenty of vim into this quarter, but their deficiency seemed too big to retrieve. Norwood were kept busy despite their big advantage. Close pulled their tally ahead also with a rummy goal. Spry and Mutton gave some good exhibitions when the ball travelled their way, but Norwood were now in the ascendancy on play. Hart and Fowler especially kept things moving for the redlegs. After a failure by Hart for goal, Close took a hand and made no mistake. Bryant booted in again to Grantley, who hitherto had been playing a steady game, but the latter's place-kick would not reach. Norwood retained their supremacy throughout the remainder of the game. Hart came through the crush again with his sixth sixer, which raised applause from his supporters. Marshall was awarded a free at centre right on the bell. Final scores were:—
