The set of League matches played this afternoon marked the termination of the minor round. Norwood, although beaten by South Adelaide, retain their position at the head of the premierships list with the accompanying advantage of a double chance of securing the premiership. Sturt, by defeating West Torrens, confirmed their place on the second line, while South Adelaide remain in the third position. North Adelaide complete the big four, having by their victory over Port Adelaide replaced West Torrens, who were disposed of by Sturt. West Adelaide's win at Glenelg's expense has put them in the sixth position, in the place of Port, who as seventh on the list occupy the lowest place the club has filled since 1900. Glenelg, who have failed to win a match in their three years in the League, have again secured the wooden spoon.

Torrens, West, Port, and Glenelg have now finished for this season, leaving Norwood, Sturt, South, and North to fight for the premiership. Norwood and South meet again next Saturday in the first semi-final, and Sturt and North a fortnight hence in the second semi-final. The victors will meet in the final on September 29. Should Norwood be defeated in their semi-final, or, surviving that, in the final, they are entitled in consequence of being minor premiers to challenge the winners of the final to a deciding match for the premiership on October 6.

Glenelg v. West Adelaide

Notwithstanding the fact that West Adelaide and Glenelg occupied the second to last and last positions respectively on the premierships list, there was a moderate attendance of supporters of both teams at the seaside oval this afternoon. Dance and Fitzgerald were excluded from the visiting team, and Martin was chosen as Glenelg's 19th man. Mr. Pounsett controlled the game. Messrs. Barrand and Thomas were boundary umpires, and Messrs. Sutcliffe and Bradshaw handled the flags.

The first quarter rucks were:—West Adelaide—Martin, Bailey, Barnes. Glenelg—Hanley, Sullivan, E. Ross.

Glenelg drew first blood soon after play began. The man responsible was Trenwith, who sent in an excellently-judged long-distance shot. Ross was responsible for Glenelg's second goal a few minutes later. His was a pretty running shot from an angle. Ross was playing a clean, clever, consistent game. After the lapse of a few moments he placed Trenwith once more in possession, and Glenelg's third goal was registered. The visitors rushed the ball along the city wing from the bounce, but Hine saved splendidly in goal. Harding was the first to raise the two flags for West Adelaide, and Barnes added the second. Bishop tried a long shot, but Dick Head marked well and returned it. Trenwith notched Glenelg's fourth goal, and two minutes later Murphy kicked back over his head and secured the fifth. Moore, Manuel, and J. Bishop were the nucleus of West Adelaide in the second quarter, and Glenelg's ruck consisted of Moore, G. Ross, and Trenwith. A few seconds after the bounce Murphy sent in Glenelg's sixth goal. It was a smart snap. Wright, at centre half-forward, gained possession for the visitors at the bounce, and with a remarkably well-judged place-kick brought his team's major tally to three. After considerable up-and-down play Wright tried to repeat the performance, but kicked too low. The ball travelled from end to end of the field, mostly on the city wing, but no noteworthy combined play was evidenced by either team. From a free Drew sent down a perfect long-distance goal for Glenelg. West Adelaide assumed control at the bounce, and after much scrimmaging Barnes again gained the maximum for West Adelaide. From this juncture the game became much faster and more spectacular. There were many individual instances of clever handball by both teams. Martin sent down a powerful punt from the city centre, but once again Head rose above his opponents and prevented scoring. The marking of both teams was particularly good during the quarter. Murphy marked well over the heads of a bunch of opponents, and the two flags responded. Again the visitors forced the play, and Wright scored the maximum. A long interval of uninteresting play followed before Bishop scored a further goal for West Adelaide, reducing Glenelg's lead to two points. Towards the conclusion of the second quarter most of the play, which had become exceedingly willing, was in favor of the home team, but attempts to score by either side resulted in minors only. West Adelaide attacked at the opening of the final bout, and after a few minutes' play drew level with the home team by scoring a minor. At the bounce West Adelaide again assumed control. Glenelg rallied and a noteworthy shot for goal by Trenwith was marked in goal by Keane. Handley marked at the kick out and placed the ball. Nothing more than a point resulted. The visitors rushed the ball down the City wing, and Bailey, marking in goal, sent the leather through. A moment later Bailey added a minor. The ball was touched. Play was fairly even for about five minutes. Then Harold tried a difficult angle. He raised but one flag. The high marking and aggressiveness of the visitors was most marked in this quarter, whereas Glenelg appeared to be tiring. There were, however, intermittent rallies by the seiders.
