TORRENS OUT-GENERALLED

Norwood Win Magnificent Victory

LAST QUARTER BLUE-AND-GOLD RALLY

For three-quarters of the Norwood-West Torrens contest on the Thebarton Oval today the home side played a game altogether opposed to the ethics of good football. They indulged in too much handball, sometimes stopping when at top speed to flip the ball backward to a comrade in no better position, and added to this blunder, they persisted time and again in driving their attacks along the wings. Both their centre and half forward lines consistently turned away, instead of in to the posts.

Norwood made the most of their opponent's mistakes. Cutting handball to a minimum, they drove the ball forward with long, well-directed kicks, and invariably took the shortest route to This, coupled with superior aerial ability, made them easily the better combination.

In the last term Torrens somewhat rebrieved their reputation, and at one stage even threatened danger. Except for one critical moment, however, Norwood were always master of the situation, and ultimately ran out comfortable winners. FINAL SCORES.

The Players

Lill was easily the best man for Norwood. He completely outplayed Brown, and it was largely due to his magnificent effort that Norwood won. When in reasonable position, Lill hardly failed to mark all day. Scott was responsible for a grand game in defence, and cool and calculating, he always seemed to do the right thing. He was ably backed up by Whitford, whose height stood him in good stead, enabling him to mark over smaller opponents repeatedly. Norwood were -very strong in the back lines, and Ackland, Stephens, and Townley all played well.

Symonds was dashing and fearless on the central flank, while Schumacher, Bent, Westley, Lee, White, Potts, and, in fact, all the red-and-blue team were responsible for useful displays.

There was no doubt about the best Derformer for Torrens. After half time O'Grady wied with Lill as being the best man on the ground. The bespectacled champion was not as sure in front of goal as is his wont but in other respects he excelled himself. Lock came next to O'Grady. Strong and fearless, he battled pard in defence, and never let up.

Pain showed that he has lost none of his football ability. He led out well, and once in possession always essayed to make the most of the opportunity. With a forward line breaking away in approved style, he would be a match winner.

Adams, both at half back and half forward, played well, and Daviess, in goal, Oaten on the wing, and Ashby and Osborn in defence, were solid performers. Mills, Marvell, Hollis, and Karney rendered useful service, but Mc-Carthy, after playing brilliantly in the first half, was seldom seen in the latter stages of the contest.

ECHOES OF THE GAMES

Rough Game at Prospect

Glenelg were decisively beaten at Prospect today by North, although it must be admitted that the play was closer than the scores indicate.

North won principally through more effective shooting for goal, although their play, taken all round, had more finish than that of the visitors, who were often unable to push their attacks

Glenelg were unduly rough at times, that being another factor which tended to spoil their chances. On this account Umpire Quinn was compelled to blow his whistle more often than should have been necessary.

There were several instances of players endeavoring to strike one another, but fortunately they were separated before anything happened.

nelg. North opened the offensive. Kinnear was freed, but Gun secured and passed to McDonald, who scored a behind. Hanley figured prominently in the ruck, and Hoft and Hine were also conspicuous. Grieve took two brilliant marks. In that department North showed supremacy.

North attacked repeatedly, but the defence of Sallis and Hine drove them back. Sprigg and Low combined in a clever forward move, but scoring did not result. Hoft carried the ball to the other end, and Owens raised one flag.

Glenelg opened the final term with a deficit of 16 points, and although they battled hard North were equally determined to maintain the lead. Morris led away from the centre.
