GLIMPSES OF THE PLAY

Glenelg Weak After Half-Time

The first half of the game between West and Glenelg was interesting but West were untroubled in the second half and ran out victors by 40 points. Glenelg were in reach of their opponents at the end of the second quarter, but after that they notched two goals only, while West added seven full-pointers.

West at times played together brilliantly and in the first half Glenelg's system was commendable. West were better in the air and generally were stronger in defence.

Barnes was the best man on the ground. Four beautiful goals came from his boot. He never missed a shot. He has few superiors at dropkicking. He roved finely and never allowed an opponent to get the better of him.

Playing much the same sort of game, but on the wing, Lloyd, of Glenelg, was little inferior. He had much the better of Harding, fast and clever, he battled hard.

Lukeman's contribution to West's tally was three goals. The tall Adelaidean played a fine game and took some excellent marks. On his form this year he is one of the best half-forwards playing. He also does well in ruck. Davis, a new man in the red-and-black colors, also did well. He secured two goals and should do even better.

McGregor played his usual strenuous game, and was invincible in the air. He was at the top of his form, and was ably supported in the pack by Peters.

Huxtable was prominent in the back-line, and so was Wright, who was solid in goals. Bishop, Martin, Dogle, and Moore also performed well.

Owens had a quiet day for Glenelg, one goal only coming from him. He, however, played well, but had few opportunities to score. He was well watched by Wright. Score Oliver played a fine game for the seiders. His work in the air was good, and he was a rare battler in the ruck.

Torpy in his first appearance with the visitors showed promise. He obtained one major and several minors, and did as well as any of the Bay forwards. He should be able to keep his place in the eighteen. Walsh also impressed the selectors. Possessing speed, weight, and marking ability he should be prominent for the seiders.

Len Sallis was consistent on the wing, while his brother did well in defence. Hoff, Perry, Spry, Hanley, Toms, and Beck also played satisfactorily.

WEST ADELAIDE V. GLENELG

Seasiders' Downfall

When Glenelg and West Adelaide met at the beginning of the season the seasiders suffered defeat by only eight points. With the Bay men showing improved form the match promised to be an interesting one.

For the first time for the season Hoff (Glenelg) won the toss and started off with the wind. Shortly after the opening Martin marked brilliantly, but had the misfortune to hit a post with his shot for goal.

Walsh and Torpy, both new men, were prominent for Glenelg, and the latter opened the tally with a behind. Within a minute he found the main opening with another good kick. West began to attack again, but Toms saved well. Barnes, however, secured and the shot for goal was never in doubt.

Glenelg, however, were not to be denied, and Parker obtained full points. Play ranged all over the field, and Walsh managed another behind for Glenelg. Barnes and Doyle sent the ball along to Lukeman, who passed to Davis. The latter, however, kicked badly, and Glenelg broke free again. Oliver marked well in the half-forward line, and a good kick added a single. Lloyd marked and also raised one flag.

McGregor and Kearns were combining well for West, while Toms (Glenelg) was bringing down some marks in the half-back line. Gates dashed through with the ball for Glenelg, but the red-and-blacks turned back the attack and replied with a single. West continued to attack, but Spry and Hine saved. McGregor caught the ball above Conlon, but Spry marked his kick, and C. Sallis made a dash down the centre.

Five points in the lead, Glenelg started off smartly in the second quarter. Oliver secured and Hoff marking finely sent the ball well forward. A behind was scored and Oliver followed with a six-pointer.

West rushed the ball into the forward line, and after scrambling play Barnes placed his second goal on the board. Harding sent the ball down the centre and Martin marked and goaled brilliantly. The scores were now even. McCard was given a chance, but booted out of bounds. West gained a lead by obtaining a single.

C. Sallis sent the ball into the forward line. Torpy had an easy chance, but raised only one flag. Torpy gained possession on the flank and neatly passed to Spry. A good shot landed short, and West began an offensive. They again struck the lead with a single, and followed with two more.

Hanley marked brilliantly from the kick-off, but Hine (in goal) was hard put to it. Lukeman snapped a goal, and Glenelg broke away. Torpy by good work gave Owens possession in front, and the champion goalkicker made no mistake.

Peters took a turn in the ruck. Barnes managed a behind, following good work by Doyle. Hine dashed out of goal and Hoff marked finely from him. He passed to Beck, who sent the ball well down the wing. West, however, stemmed the tide. Lloyd and Gotts began another attack, but West cleared and Davis obtained full points.

Lloyd was prominent on the wing for Glenelg, but the seasiders could not penetrate West's half-back line. Conlon was unable to mark against McGregor, who was in his best form. Burke obtained a minor and Huxtable turned back a Glenelg attack.

The Bay men at last had a turn with the ball, and Torpy brought up one flag.

Sallis and Lloyd were battling hard, but West worked the ball forward. Peters marked finely and forwarded to Kempster, but Conlon cleared. Good play by Bishop gave Lukeman a chance and the latter booted truly. West were combining well, and Bishop made a brilliant run, as the outcome of which Lukeman added another goal.

Glenelg replied with a behind, but the red-and-blacks once more dashed away along the far wing. Lukeman and Hoff were prominent in the air, and Oliver was battling hard in the ruck for Glenelg. Lukeman to McGregor and thence to Davis resulted in another goal for West. Glenelg seemed unable to score. Barnes was roving finely, but Glenelg had rallied and were attacking.
