## Seasiders' Dashing Display

Probably the best crowd that has ever attended the Glenelg Oval was there this afternoon, when Torrens (last year's premiers) met Gleneig. Walsh stood down from the seasiders, and O'Malley was not required by Torrens. Umpire J. Quinn had charge of the match.

The opening ruckmen were Mills, Broderick, and Karney for Torrens, and Toms, Sampson, and Getts for Gienelg. Although the visitors were first away Glenelg quickly recovered, and in a few seconds were pressing at Torrens' goal and drew first blood, Toms having registered a behind. From the kick-off the ball came back again, Owens was interiered with, and taking his kick scored full points.

Torrens momentarily gained control. Fleet sent the ball into the goal mouth. Glenelg, however, came with a rattle and Turpy passed to Jackson, who with a good kick placed Glenelg's second goal on the board.

Torrens again broke loose, and Mills managed a single. After even play Brown passed to Fleet, but the ball was again brought back to the centre. W. Hill, a new man, was defending brilliantly for the seasiders, while Minear was prominent for the blue-and-golds. Adams marking well for Torrens placed the ball. but his shot fell short.

"Snow" Exley, a former team-mate of C. Hoft, from the Perth Club, is expected to strengthen the forward line, Exley has been living at Glenelg since June, and has qualified. Usually he plays half forward, and should do well in that position, as he is tall and wellbuilt.

In Jim Handby, Glenelg will have a brilliant defender. Handby, who lives at Scacliff, previously played for South, and last season was one of that team's best.

Another experienced player who is still living in the Glenelg district to II. Lyne, who distinguished himself in Sturt's back line. Efforts are being made to induce Lyne to don the yellow-ind-black guernsey.

Harold Jackson, another Sturt player, living at Glenelg, has promised to strip for the seasiders. Jackson, who is a brother of Keith, Sturt's centre half forward, has been a brilliant defender in the B grade, and is a Magarey medallist.

Broken Hill will again send some recruits to the Glenelg ranks Jack Ward, who played at centre for West Broken Hill, has been secured. Davey from Albany (Western Australia) is also likely to be seen in the Glenelg colors this season. C. Tilbrook, a fine centre half forward, who has done well for Glenelg previously, has now decided to live in that

# GLENELG BEAT 1924 PREMIERS.

### GLENELG'S FIRST WIN.

### Defeat Last Year's Premiers.

There was a record attendance at the Gleneig Oval on Saturday afternoon. Altogether 5,060 persons paid for attendance, and the takings amounted to £212. Gleneig met West Terrons, last year's premiers. Gleneig, the youngest club in the league, had gone four years without winning a match, but they broke the ice on Saturday, when, after a spirited contest, they defeated the visitors by eight points.

Mr. J. Quinn was central umpire. The opening rucks were:—Gleuelg—Toms, Sampson, and Gotts: West Torrens—Broderick, Mills, and Karney. Hoft winning the toss, decided to kick towards the north, as there was a fairly strong southerly breeze blowing. Immediately on the bounce Glenelg attacked, and after

first to captain a winning Glenelg A grade team.

vigorous play, in which Sampson and Toms figured prominently, Owens, from a free, scored the first goal. Jackson shortly afterwards kicked a fine goal from an acute angle. Torrens by good combined play on the part of Brown, Karney, and Outen sent the ball to Mills, who succeeded in raising only one flag. Encouraged by a further goal by Toms, the "tigers" again attacked, and C. Hill, from a running dropkick close to the boundary, scored Gleneig's fourth goal. Hill soon again became prominent, being successful in raising the two flags with a fine, low dropkick.

Torrens Force the Pace. With the wind in their favour, Torrens not out to wipe off their deficit; and runhed Glenelg off their feet in the first few minutes of the term. When Karney kicked a goal immediately following on the bounce the hopes of their supporters increased perceptibly. Glenelg worked the ball into the Torreus' territory. Lyne passed t-Owens, who took a splendid mark between two opponents, and followed it up with the best goal of the day. At half-time the scores were: - Glenelg, 6.3; West Torrens, 5.6.

Gleneig suffered a severe setback in the third term owing to Handby receiving an injury to a knee. Up to this point he had been probably Gleneig's best man, and to have him practically put out of action was a bonry blow. After working the hall forward with the assistance of Lloyd and Lyne. Toms secured a good mark and succeeded in kicking his second goal for the day. The play for some time was even, but eventually Owens.

This goal practically made the game a certainty for the seasiders. Brown made great efforts by shifting his men to various positions to break the Glenelg defence. Hoft appeared to be more concerned about his rucks, which he changed very frequently in order to make the pace as hot as possible. Adams was proving a thorn in Glenelg's side, and had Torrens won, it would, undoubtedly, have been due to his play. Daviess, by good play, worked the ball up the field. Minear passed to Fleet, who successfully goaled. When, with two minutes to go, Adams kicked another goal for the vist tors, the excitement was intense. Time, however, was against last season's pre-miers, and the Bays ran out victors by eight points, after a splendidly cought contest.

Great Enthusiasm. The utmost enthusiasm prevailed among Glenelg supporters when the bell rang for the last time. They rushed the field and every man was carried off the ground, Hoft and Owens being the recipients of a tremendous ovation from the pavillon as they were borne to the dressing room. The Torrens supporters took their defeat splendidly. Brown, the Torrens skipper. and Karney, his lieutenant, were among the first to go to the Gleneig dressing room and offer congratulations to the victors. The only incident that marred the proceedings occurred as the umpire, Mr. Quinn, was leaving the field. It was stated that as he passed through the oval gate on his way to the umpires' dressing room he was pushed and tripped by a West Torrens player. He fell on his face, cutting his right elbow and knee, and being covered in dirt. It is understood that he intendreporting the matter to the league. With regard to Glenelg's victory, Hoft demonstrated his ability as a footballer and his qualifications as a leader.
