

NORWOOD TOO STRONG FOR TORRENS

Injuries Hamper Gold-and-Blue Eighteen

GLENELG WIN AGAINST SOUTH

Only two league games were contested today, and both produced fast, vigorous football.

At Norwood the home side accounted for Torrens after a particularly hard-fought fight, by 15 points. Torrens after half-time were weakened by injuries to two or three of their players.

On the Adelaide Oval Glenelg, after beginning rather poorly, finished strongly to win from South by 10 points.

GLENELG MEET SOUTH

South Adelaide and Glenelg, both of which teams have failed to win a match this season—although the former has a drawn game to its credit—provided the attraction on the Adelaide Oval this afternoon.

In consequence of the postponement of the races at Victoria Park the attendance was considerably augmented.

H. Grove was an absentee from South's ranks on account of injuries, while the seaisiders' eighteen was strengthened by the inclusion of Lyne and Hoff.

The oval, despite the heavy rain overnight, was in fair condition, but was inclined to be somewhat slippery.

Umpire J. Quinn had charge of the game.

Winning the toss Oliver attacked at the cathedral end. A penalty kick to Sprigg at the bounce sent the ball down among the forwards, but the yellow-and-black back relieved. Play was then transferred to the river end, and a behind resulted. Thomas marked brilliantly, and Lloyd was prominent on the centre line.

South attacked strongly, and a goal came from C. Ryan. The seaisiders were showing a tendency to run too much with the ball, and were thus spoiling their chances of scoring. An easy goal to A. J. Ryan was the sign for renewed onslaughts on the yellow-and-black's goal front, and play for several minutes was confined to the cathedral end.

Glenelg moved forward and C. Sallis goaled from a fairly difficult angle. A. J. Ryan replied with a similar score for the blue-and-whites. Another six-pointer from the same player a few moments afterwards won for him the applause of the spectators. South were proving superior in the air, and were also displaying better system than their opponents. Lack of cohesion among the yellow-and-black's forward division was also contributing to South's success.

Hoff, Oliver, and Lloyd were showing to advantage for the seaisiders, while A. J. Ryan, May, and O'Malley were useful players in South's combination.

Quarter Time

Glenelg attacked early in the quarter, and an opportunity to score was frustrated by over-eagerness on the part of the forwards. Owens, however, made amends by piloting through a major, followed the next minute by another sixer from the foot of Hack.

The seaisiders were momentarily in charge, and when Owens sent through another goal the stands rang with the applause of supporters of the yellow-and-black.

The seaisiders were now playing with better co-operation, and their marking also showed an improvement. A fine piece of aerial work by Hack sent the ball among the forwards, but nothing came of the thrust. A free to McKay relieved the tension, and the ball sailed towards the river end, only to be returned again.

Play was now faster and more open, with the advantage in favor of Glenelg. Oliver and Handby came into collision on the centre line, and the latter was momentarily dazed. An effort by Sprigg to score carried wide, but Downs shortly afterward found the big open-

ing. Glenelg were beating their men to the ball, but a tendency to run too much was neutralising their effort. South were in possession when the half-time bell rang.

The quarter was characterised by the effectiveness of Glenelg's play, and this was noticeable in most departments of the game.

A free to Lloyd sent the ball among the forwards, resulting in scrimmaging play around the goal mouth, from which position Owens snapped a six pointer. Glenelg were now in front for the second time during the afternoon. Handby saved well, but play continued to hover round the centre line.

Glenelg asserted superiority, and Owens, who had proved a reliable forward, put through his fourth goal for the day. South replied with a minor. Handby and O'Malley were playing superbly, and the former's marking was magnificent. The yellow-and-black were carrying all before them, and a goal to C. Sallis placed the side in a commanding position.

South, however, were not to be denied, and a six-pointer to Organ raised the hopes of South supporters. Glenelg still hung on tenaciously, but the blue-and-whites system was proving superior. A goal to Gooden placed the team a point in front.

Another six-pointer to Organ saw the pendulum swing round in South's favor, and the ball again sailed into dangerous territory, a behind resulting.

Lyne, after a fine run down the centre, snapped a goal just as the bell rang.

Three-quarter time.

Congested play round the river end goal marked the opening of the last quarter—from there A. J. Ryan raised the twin flags. South now had an eight-point advantage, but it was reduced to two behinds in almost the next instant by a nice kick by Owens.

A good mark by Downs transferred the play into the yellow-and-black's territory, but Handby relieved. A. J. Ryan added another point to his side's score, and a fairly easy chance was missed by Owens. Glenelg supporters cheered loudly when C. Sallis placed the team in the lead once more. The yellow-and-black were now staging a spectacular revival and were carrying all before them. Another goal to Glenelg put them 11 points in the lead, and attack after attack was made on South's citadel, resulting in a major to Owens, his sixth of the afternoon.

Downs replied with a goal for South, but play again turned towards the Cathedral end.

Both sides were playing strongly when the bell rang, leaving the yellow-and-black with an advantage of 10 behinds. They had thus won the first game of the season.

FIRST FOR SEASON

Glenelg Overpower South

In a game characterised by spectacular play, Glenelg this afternoon defeated South Adelaide. The yellow-and-black hung on tenaciously throughout the first two quarters, but from then onward appeared to have the measure of their opponents. Their success in the main was due to fine play on the part of Handby and Owens, backed up by the good team work of the remainder of the eighteen.

The rain overnight had had its effect on the ground, and players in both teams experienced a difficulty when trying to run with the ball. Glenelg, if anything, were a little too anxious to run, and often a good chance of sending the ball into the forward division was lost because of this fault. Their kicking in the first half was also erratic, but it improved toward the end of the match.

Handby was the hero of the day, and his marking on the back line was magnificent. He also kicked well.

The goalgetting honors went to Owens, who bagged six majors during the afternoon. He displayed initiative and was not afraid to go into the crushes after the ball. He played full forward.

C. Sallis and P. Leverington were also useful on the forward line, the former kicking three goals. Over-eagerness on their part in getting rid of the ball spoilt several opportunities to score.

O'Malley in defence gave a first-class exhibition, while others who did well were Gun, Perry, Davies, Lyne, and L. Sallis.

A. J. Ryan was somewhat unlucky in his kicking, but nevertheless he was successful in raising the twin flags on four occasions for South. He was closely watched throughout the afternoon, and few openings were left him.

South's centre line—Griffiths, May, and Herde—were a strong trio, but they were overpowered in the latter stages of the game.

Oliver, Organ, Downs, C. Ryan, and Gooden played a useful game for the blue-and-whites, and their exhibition on the whole was good.
