PROVE TOO FAST FOR NORWOOD AT ALBERTON

Find Goalsneak Redlegs Must Good

In a match lacking brilliance Port were too good for Norwood at Alberton today. The magpies established an early lead, and were thereafter always too far ahead of Norwood for the latter to have any apparent chance after the first change of ends.

In the first half of the game Port were distinctly the better side. They were faster to the ball and displayed better team work.

The victory of Port today was their seventh successive win over Norwood, as far as matches played at Alberton are concerned.

Margitich put up an excellent performance for the losers by kicking 11 out of 14 goals.

With wins against West and Torrens to their credit Glenelg took the field confident that they would their third victory at the expense of South.
