## STURT SNATCH VICTORY

### Even Scoring Against Glenelg

#### SIX GOALS KICKED BY BAUER

In a match that was evenly contested throughout, Sturt snatched victory from Glenelg in the last five minutes of the game.

Scores were level at the end of the second and third quarters, and again about five minutes before the final bell.

The scores were a fair indication of the merits of the two teams.

Both teams were as published. Umpire L. W. Whitford had charge of the game. Brown won the toss, and elected to kick to the southern goal, which was favored by a light breeze.

Handby turned an attack by Sturt. Bateman marked, but did not get his boot to the ball. Receiving from Sexton, Winkler had a shot. It fell short, and Thompson, who picked up the ball in a scrimmage, kicked wildly, and sent it out of bounds. Riley and C. Whitehead held Glenelg at bay. Bateman was prominent at centre, where he was outmarking Sexton. Wundersitz placed Mattner in possession, and an easy goal resulted.

Glenelg rushed the ball goalward, but Stuart and Fisher drove them out. At the other end Wiese rendered yeoman service for Glenelg. The seashiders were finding it difficult to score, the Sturt defenders showing out well. Bauer fumbled a mark in front of an open goal, but when hard pressed by two opponents, cleverly snapped full points. A few moments later he goaled again. Owens narrowly missed the central opening in putting on his third single.

Lloyd and Johnston combined to give Thompson a chance, and the first goal for the seashiders was recorded. Johnston was marking brilliantly. A few moments before the bell rang Brown was hurt in a scramble on the eastern boundary. He received treatment from the trainers during the interval.

#### First Quarter

Owens broke his run of singles with a goal. Sexton initiated a move that brought a phenomenal mark and full points from Johnston. Dunn was in the way of the next advance. Riley, Scrutton, and Whitehead combined to give Bauer a chance, but an easy shot brought only a single.

Lloyd forwarded, and Owens, from a free, goaled from what appeared an impossible angle on the north boundary. A free to Simpson relieved the next advance. Fisher relieved, but Martin sent the ball to an opponent, and it was returned. Owens recorded a single. Dunn sent to Martin, whose long kick was marked by Riley. He punted an easy goal. Simon marked well in a bunch. The goal umpire, in taking position, appeared to get over the line, but the two flags were raised.

The scores were even, both teams having 33 points. C. Hill made a spectacular run down the centre of the field. Owens picked up cleverly and snapshotted a goal. Sallis turned a Sturt rush, and then L. Griffiths did the same. Sims out-generalled F. Oliver, the Glenelg goalkeeper, and ran into an open goal sending the ball through. Sturt were attacking strongly as the bell rang. The game had been closely contested throughout, and the even scores gave a fair indication of play.

#### Second Quarter

STURT ..... 6-3  
GLENELG ..... 5-9

Bateman sent Sturt forward from the bounce, but Handby drove them back. Owens had a shot, but it fell short. A

few moments later he picked up the ball on the boundary, and sent it through. It was called back, however, having been forced out of bounds before he secured it. The Sturt defenders cleared. Griffiths made a brilliant run from half-back to the half-forward line. He was interfered with, and the resultant free was marked by Johnston, who goaled.

Green, Simon, and Thomas pressed the attack for Sturt, but it was left to Wundersitz to record the needed goal. Glenelg looked dangerous until Riley drove them out. Handby returned the ball, and full points came from Thompson. A spectacular mark by Fisher relieved a tense situation. Lloyd and Thompson gave Winkler a chance, and a long kick brought a goal. Martin and Green drove the seashiders out, and the move culminated in a goal.

This was Bauer's third goal for the match. The seashiders were not to be denied, however, and their next thrust saw Winkler goal again. Then the double-blues settled down determinedly, and two successive goals by Bauer made scores even again. The spectators were worked to a high pitch of excitement, and a thrilling last quarter seemed assured.

Fisher, Bateman, and Tuohy were prominent in a Sturt advance, but W. Hill sent them back as the bell rang.

#### Third Quarter

GLENELG ..... 9-10

Riley stayed off two Glenelg attacks early in the final term. Handby and W. Hill held Sturt off for a time, but they broke through with a goal from Thomas. Handby, Harris, and C. Hill were prominent in a Glenelg offensive. A safe mark by Simpson relieved the tension. Sexton and Johnston took the ball to the goalmouth, where a brilliant mark by Riley eased the situation.

The seashiders continued to maintain the pressure, and full points came from Brown. Scores were again even. Barbary sent the ball in, but Simon marked and relieved. A long shot by Winkler was marked on the goal line by Fisher. The ball was flashed down the centre of the field, and with a snapshot from a scrimmage Bauer placed the double-blues six points in front.

Winkler again evened scores with a magnificent mark and kick. Handby and Riley were doing wonders for their respective teams.

Whitehead sent Sturt supporters wild with delight when he secured in a scrimmage and goaled. The bell rang with Bauer in possession and racing for goal.

**H.** Bauer left no doubt regarding the wisdom of his selection by Sturt. He showed great initiative in getting into position, and recorded six goals from seven scoring shots. Several of his full pointers were from snapshots after working the ball out of scrummages.

**J.** Handby was again one of the star performers for Glenelg, his rushes down the field and telling kicks being a feature of the match. He was handicapped in the closing stages from a knock on the same leg as was injured in the interstate match last Saturday.

**L.** Sallis has been in great fettle for Glenelg in recent matches, and his showing today was another fine performance. He is fast and uses great judgment in going for the ball, and in leading out when a comrade is in possession.

**G.** B. Johnston heralded his reappearance with some of his remarkable freak marks. He was quiet in the early stages, but soon came under notice for spectacular leaps. He received more than a fair share of rough handling during the day.

**T.** THE Sturt and Glenelg centre lines provided an interesting tussle, with the seashide trio showing out just a little better than their opponents. V. Bateman had the call over J. Sexton for the greater part of the game, although the Glenelg pivot did much useful work. J. Lloyd and G. Barbary, however, were a shade superior to C. Scrutton and R. Tuohy on the flanks.

**E.** Fisher was brilliant in defence for Sturt. His safe, and at times spectacular marking on many occasions turned Glenelg attacks just as they appeared certain of success.
