Intend to Claim Match Against Port

Magpies Gave Better Display

SIX GOALS TO GEUE; FIVE TO DAYMAN

Although Port finished 13 points ahead of Torrens at Thebarton today, it is by no means certain that they will get the match.

Provided that the rules allow them to do so, Torrens have decided to protest to the league and claim the game, as it is alleged that Port had 19 players on the ground at one stage during the final term.

On the day Port gave a better display. Torrens are a rugged combination at present, and I do not think they will achieve much success this season. Port played well at times, but faulty tactics in the second quarter cost them dearly.

CLOSE-UPS OF PLAYERS

J. Lloyd, who played an excellent game against Norwood last Saturday, gave another sound display against South. In the first half of the game he outpointed Mackay, and repeatedly sent the ball forward.

ONE of the most prominent players for South was F. J. Tully. He appeared to be all over the ground. Equally as effective when placed as when roving, he was a thorn in the side of Glenelg throughout the game. His foot passing was most accurate.

IN kicking five goals C. Hall did well. He scouted with judgment and made best use of all opportunities which came his way.

ONE of South's most stubborn defenders was W. H. Jackson. Time after time he turned attacks, and relieved dangerous situations with long kicks.

THE best player of his age in the game is W. Scott (captain of Norwood). Against North he gave an inspired performance when his team was hard pressed. His marking was superb.

G. B. Johnston was one of the hardest workers for Glenelg. His ruck work was sound and his high marking conspicuous. He held the ball much better today than he did in the last match.

J. Owens, who kicked five goals for Glenelg, did better when placed half-forward. He appeared to have greater scope in that position than when goalseeker. He scored two majors in quick succession immediately the change was made.

S. Jaffer (captain of South) has good reason to be satisfied with the form displayed by his men, especially the combination exhibited in the last quarter. High marking and well-judged ground work by Jaffer set a good example.

AS reliable as ever, Jim Handby played a solid game for Glenelg. His sure marking and dogged ground play, with an occasional well-judged run, saved his side on many occasions.

L. Sallis was best man for Glenelg. Sure in the air, he outclassed his immediate opponent. His ground play was also all that could be desired. Many excellent drives instituted by him were not followed up by Glenelg forwards.

K. Farmer must be ranked as one of the best North players against Norwood, despite that he did not kick a goal in the last half. He got six before half-time. His marking was again spectacular, and his ground play good.

M. Pontifex, Torrens new centreman, acquitted himself well in his first senior game. He had the better of his contest with H. Terrell, chiefly shining in the air. Pontifex is only 20 years of age, and with more experience should do even better.

LAST QUARTER RUSH

South Overwhelm Glenelg

Brilliant combination and rushes direct for goal in the last quarter gave South a great victory against Glenelg at Adelaide.

The blue-and-whites added 62 points, while Glenelg managed only 13. Scores were level at three-quarter time.

Jaffer won the toss for South, and elected to kick to the river end. Glenelg began with a rush, two behinds being scored in quick succession. They kept in front of their opponents, and were faster to the ball. A snapshot by Owens hit a post.

Jumping high above the pack Collier took a spectacular mark within a few yards of the goal. His shot raised both flags.

South scored their first point after 15 minutes of play, when Cornish had a shot near goal. Still having the better of the game Glenelg outmarked South. Handby was solid in defence.

With a beautiful place kick Gardiner scored first goal for South. At the other end Rosewarne and Owens added majors for the visitors. Paech did likewise for South.

South began to brighten, but their passing on several occasions failed to reach its objective. The game was fast and open.

South did better with the change of ends. Gardiner scored the maximum with another place kick. Lloyd had the better of several interesting duels with Mackay. South players frequently spoiled each other in the air.

Edwards (Glenelg) was carried from the field, and Wiese took his place. Gardiner again showed his prowess as a placekicker when he scored his third, and the fourth goal for South. It was a beautiful long, low shot.

A place shot, the result of a free kick, was missed by Gardiner. Thompson called up both flags, and again placed Glenelg in the lead.

South kept the Glenelg defenders busy. A goal from Hebbard, quickly followed by two full-pointers by Hall, gave South a substantial lead. Two long punches by Mackay (centre) and McEntee (half-forward) placed the ball in South forward area. Hall capped the attack with a goal, his third.

Faced with a deficit of 23 points, Glenelg made several alterations in the placing of the team. change in tactics by the visitors was a success. Owens obtained another sixer. There was amusement when goal umpire F. H. Bridgland was hit in the face by the ball, which was kicked by Cornish. The player was only a few yards away. It was a goal.

Glenelg kept the ball forward, but could manage only behinds. Owens marked at a difficult angle and kicked truly. The game was fast and open, the ball travelling quickly from man to man.

Repeatedly South got the ball forward, but could not score. Wickham added full points for the seaiders and brought them within six points of South. Unnecessary footpassing in front of goal lost opportunities for Glenelg, who were now having most of the play.

Morrow goaled with a long punt, and equalized the score. South followed the bad example set by their opponents and unsuccessfully attempted short passes in front of goal. Golden opportunities were lost. Hall had a shot after the ball, but no score resulted.

Gardiner marked well and placed the ball on the ground. His fifth goal came as the result of a good kick.

South appeared to have the game in their keeping. They defeated Glenelg in all departments. The bay men appeared to tire. Owens punted his fifth goal.

The home side were much too fast for Glenelg in the closing stages. Mackay had an influence on the game. He instituted several attacks which bore fruit.

Glenelg could not hold the blue-and-whites, who did practically as they liked. Glenelg made a determined effort, but Jackson was in the way. Then Owens marked but his kick went out of bounds.

Away went the ball to South forward area. A goal from Masters and two points were added in quick time.
