### Defeat Port in Hard, Vigorous Game

#### McGregor Succeeds as Coach

#### BRILLIANT DISPLAY BY MACKAY ON WING

There was no fluke about the defeat of Port by South at Adelaide today. The city players have shown great improvement under the coaching of Bruce McGregor, formerly of West.

South again played a hard, vigorous game, and they are likely to make a serious fight for inclusion in the final four.

South were distinctly superior in the air, they played together better as a team and outstayed Port.

The magpies gave a disappointing display, their chief weakness being across the centre. Port have several good players on the injured list, but they must look to their laurels to retain a place in the first four.

THERE is not a keener team in the league. After years of defeats, the three successes that have come their way have infused a great spirit into the side.

## STURT OUTPLAYED

### First Victory for Glenelg

None of the spectators who went to Glenelg anticipated the form that the Bay team showed in the first quarter against Sturt. The home side began in dazzling fashion, and for the last three quarters fought tenaciously to win by 15 points.

It was a surprise for Sturt, Glenelg deserved their victory, for on the day they were the better team. Sturt had an off day, and were weakened by the absence of two of their most prominent players—Whitehead and Dunn.

Glenelg won the toss and took advantage of a light breeze. A series of passes ended with a fine mark and goal by Drew Owens again Glenelg flashed forward, and a quick snapshot by Link just curled inside the large opening. This was a surprise opening, and the supporters of Glenelg roared their delight.

Going forward again, Glenelg won further success, Owens winning a goal. The same player scored again soon after, and Glenelg were four goals to nil.

Sturt had not made a forward move, but Bateman set them attacking, and Martin goal.

There were roars of applause when Glenelg, surging forward, won the sixth goal. Sturt, pulling them selves together, began to have more of the play. Barron scored a much needed goal, but Morton aroused groans of dismay by missing from right in front after having marked grandly. His was the first behind scored, the game having been in progress 22 minutes.

Hill goal for Glenelg, and then Owens followed with another, his fourth. Before the quarter ended Thompson scored another, making nine for the quarter.

### First Quarter

Form shown by Glenelg had been a revelation. With the wind in their favor Sturt went forward, but their forwards were out of place.

The double-blues at length managed to break through. Morton missed, but Williams, from a free, scored six points. The same player raised a point soon afterward.

Most of the attacks now came from Sturt, but they were not to be compared with their efficient offensives of the previous week. Williams hit a post from a scrimmage, but followed with a goal. Glenelg's diminishing effectiveness made the game less attractive as a spectacle, and crashes were frequent.

Sturt initiated a series of attacks which

produced goals from Green and Williams. Glenelg notched a point, and then Sturt came again, Leak goaling. At this stage (Green) Sturt left the field and Thomas took his place.

### Second Quarter

A quick dash forward by Glenelg found Owens waiting, and the result was a goal. In a subsequent Glenelg attack Wadham fell heavily, and the game was held up while he recovered.

Williams flashed out with a clever goal for Sturt, and Glenelg immediately began to hammer at the Sturt goal. Owens could not do the distance, and from the following shot scored a behind. Hard bumps were being exchanged. Umpire Currie was not calling up the play for minor breaches of the rules.

A run of non-scoring was broken by a goal from Owens, his sixth. Not long afterward he bagged another, and the lead of Glenelg began to resume formidable proportions. Just before the end of the term Owens kicked another full-point, making his total for the match eight, and for the quarter four.

### Third Quarter

Already six goals ahead, Glenelg made the margin wider early in the last term with a goal from Thompson. Sturt, however, were exerting more determination, and two quick thrusts brought goals from Leak and Thomas. The visitors were now showing better system in attack. Good play paced Martin in possession, and he booted the third Sturt goal for the quarter. Glenelg still had four goals to spare, and a keen battle was being waged. Glenelg were mostly on the defensive.

The game was still ragged and unattractive, with the players crowding the ball. Owens missed a grand chance to goal for Glenelg, and the play went back to the Sturt attacking line, where a vigorous battle was being waged. The ball at length found its way to Morton, who kicked truly.

Glenelg were hanging tenaciously to their lead, but could not bring any of their forward moves to fruition. Williams (Sturt) hit a post from a difficult shot. Sturt combined to press hotly, but the minutes were slipping away, and they still needed 16 points. Sturt were battling hard to break through when the bell rang.

# CLOSE-UPS OF PLAYERS IN LEAGUE MATCHES

**W.** J. Mackay, of South, was the best of the 36 players at Adelaide today. His marking, turning, and vigorous ground work stamp this South wingman as a probable carnival player.

**T**HE outstanding player for North today was H. Fleet. On numerous occasions he left his goal with judgment and turned back attacks. His marking was sure, and his kicking excellent. Fleet must be considered for carnival honors.

**E**VERY Glenelg player did his bit toward the victory scored over Sturt. It was in attack, however, that the Bay team did its best work. J. Owens was again in grand form, and his eight goals were the result of clever and resourceful play.

**H**EAVY work fell on the shoulders of W. Martin in the ruck against Glenelg because of the absence of C. Whitehead and W. K. Dunn. Martin performed in solid fashion, and was a force in attack.

**W**HEN roving or at half-forward, W. Thomas was a bundle of energy for North. He scored three goals in capital style. Fast to the ball, he turned quickly and picked out a man well.

**P.** Furler and C. Wiltshire worked hard for North. In addition to doing the bulk of the ruck work they kicked three and two goals respectively. R. Bruce, who obtained three majors, was prominent throughout the match.

**T**HE feature of the play of F. E. Errey, of South, is that he can kick equally well with either foot. South are fortunate in having a young player of his ability and promise in their ranks.

**F.** J. Tully is a resourceful and effective rover for South. His secret of success is that he runs a full 10 yards before attempting to bounce the ball. He seldom misses getting his kick.

**P**LAYING at half-back on the left wing F. J. Brown was best man for Torrens. He was a thorn in the side of North forwards throughout the match. His ground play was excellent, and he passed accurately.

**T.** McInerney and W. Donnan did fairly well for Port against South. Generally Port forwards were not up to form.

**T**HERE was no player more pleased at the Glenelg victory against Sturt than J. Handby (captain), and no player who contributed more to it. Whether in the crashes or in open play, he was always effective. He blocked Sturt attacks time and again.

**A** great battler for Torrens was O. M. Bertram. He put plenty of vigor into his play, and was equally effective when roving as when placed.

**G.** B. Johnston was a conspicuous figure in the Glenelg team which defeated Sturt. His ruck work was effective, and he marked brilliantly. Another outstanding player was F. Wiese, who smashed many promising Sturt attacks.

**A**T half-forward Glenelg were well represented by E. Thompson and Sallis, who did good work in passing the ball on. C. Drew and C. Hill were also efficient in the forward pockets. R. Collier, who came into the team at the last moment because H. Morrow was late in arriving, was well worth his place.

**E.** R. Masters was the best man for South in the final term against Port. His marking and strong ruck play were features of his game.

**U**NTIL hurt, C. Maywald, was doing well as goalkeeper for Port. His absence from the game after half-time made South's task easier.

**G**LLENELG were well represented across the centre, where J. Lloyd and E. Guiney had a great battle with their immediate opponents. R. Coleman also showed form at centre. V. Bateman (Sturt pivot) did not exercise such an influence over the game as usual.

**C.** Hall, South's vigorous rover and forward, is a player above average class. He scored three goals today and did plenty of other good work.

**K.** Farmer was responsible for a fine marking display against Torrens. His three goals were the result of capital football. Although closely watched by A. Kean, he was frequently in position to receive the ball.

**A**LTHOUGH not as effective as usual, V. Bateman performed solidly for Sturt. He is a consistent star. The crowded nature of the play affected his game. H. W. Johnston was often under notice on a central flank.

**I**N a back pocket J. Wadham was the star of the Sturt defence against Glenelg. Even after a heavy fall, which laid him out, he did fine work in relieving. E. W. Sims and L. Simon lent good support.

**W.** T. Hebbard plays a vigorous game in the ruck for South. Hebbard is the type of man who would do well in any class of football. His claims for selection in the carnival team must receive consideration.

**O**NE of the best men for Torrens today was A. Kean. Stationed in goal, he turned many attacks. He kicked off well, and made the task of Farmer (North goalcreek) most difficult.

**S.** E. Hewitt was the pick of South defenders. He cleared from the half-back line in dashing style. W. Jackson and S. R. Jaffer, other members of the half-back line, were not as prominent as usual.

**A**GAIN an outstanding player for Sturt was L. Leak, whose dashing work against Glenelg on a half-forward flank earned much applause. H. Riley, at centre half-forward, was noticed occasionally.

**T**HE Port rovers, T. Quinn and T. Waye, are both in great form. Against South today Quinn was probably the better of the two.

**V.** Johnson, Port captain, is playing consistently well this season. He gave another effective exhibition of ruck work today.

**S**O well is A. J. Williams (Sturt) playing this season that it is thought that he has claims for carnival honors. His play against Glenelg was a revelation of cleverness in eluding opponents.
