Glenelg Start Well But Fade Away Mistake to Play Injured Man

FARMER OUTSTANDING WITH NINE GOALS

In the first term and until half-way through the second Glenelg appeared to have the measure of North at Adelaide today, but from then on the red-and-whites were complete masters of the situation.

A feature of North's play was the goalkicking of Farmer, who scored nine goals, the result of good all-round play and accurate kicking.

The turning point in the game came in the second term when McDowall, faced with a 20-point deficit, made several changes in the placings of his team. Had McDowall delayed his action until balf-time it might have been too late.

At half-time Bail, of Gleneig, was found to be suffering from a broken nose. With a st and fresh reserve available I think that it was foolish to allow Bail to play in the second half. He did fairly well up to half-time, but after that was rarely sighted. The ground at Adelaide was hard. Teams
