## MAGPIES MEET LITTLE OPPOSITION

### Rugged but Unimpressive Play by West Torrens

#### NO LIGHT ON FINAL CHANCES

**ALTHOUGH** Torrens threatened danger in the second term, Port had things all their own way in the second half at Adelaide Oval. Torrens apart from in front of goal, are a ragged combination. Without any serious attempt at combined play, the Thebarton men play a wild and woolly game that will never bring much success.

I had hoped to get a line on Port's premiership prospects, but today's game was of little value.

Torrens played such a poor game that it was impossible to gauge how Port are likely to shape on the city ground when opposed by one of the leading teams.

The magpies, however, did all that was required of them and won by the handsome margin of 50 points.

Port certainly won by a wide enough margin, but there are places in the team that need strengthening. The return of Graves to a wing position will assist greatly, as Mucklow and N. Hender are hardly up to standard.

Port also appear uncertain in attack, where J. Johnson, goalsneak, is still green. He got four goals today, but all in a purple patch in the third term. The whole life of the Port attack depends on Dayman at half-forward, and Waye, whose clever ground play must always disconcert opposing defenders.

Port's real strength is in defence, where Ween, Mott, Maywald, and Allingham are a quartet that stiffen the whole side. With R. Johnson still to come into the team, Port should certainly make it difficult for opposing forwards to score in the finals.

With Sturt's form not as convincing as a month ago, Port's premiership prospects are enhanced. North, however, are going to be difficult to defeat in the finals.

**SALLIS** was the best man on the ground in the match between Glenelg and West on Glenelg Oval. His fine judgment and telling long kicks to the forwards made him one of the main factors in the win by his side. He defeated Sexton pointlessly for three-quarters of the game. The West man was better than him in the second term.

## SALLIS SHINES

### Glenelg Too Fast for West

**MAINTAINING** a fine burst of speed in the last quarter, Glenelg finished too strongly for West on Glenelg Oval.

An outstanding individual display was that of Sallis, opposed to Sexton at centre. Except for the second term, he defeated the West man pointlessly.

No alteration was made in the Glenelg side. Williams was absent from West, and Brodie was included. Parry was nineteenth man. Mr. T. W. Elliott was central umpire.

Handby, who won the toss, directed his men to kick toward the southern goal. A smart clearance by Connell and Church at the bounce ended in a scramble near centre. From then Glenelg took the direct road to goal, Link and Rosewarne showing out. The former goalied from a free, and within a few seconds Wundersitz repeated the effort.

Both sides were using their weight freely. Glenelg, with Handby prominent, were playing with greater dash, and their handling of the ball was more certain than that of the visitors. West shook off their sluggishness, and in a hard attack scored their first goal from Golding. Within a short time Owens goalied twice and Griffiths once for Glenelg, and H. Graham once for West. Up to this stage eight scoring shots had produced seven goals.

Play was not of high standard. Men on both sides handled the ball with no degree of certainty. The kicking for goal was accurate, but the passing was uncertain. A good angle shot by Owens brought another goal, and fine anticipation by Wundersitz added the seventh for the Bay team. Individually the Glenelg forwards were playing well.

Shea was in good form at centre wing for West, but the forwards were crowding the ball too much. Kempster performed well in front of goal, but an easy shot brought only a single.

Within a few seconds of the start of the second term Glenelg rushed a point, and then Owens found the main opening with a long shot. The home team was dominating the play, and with Sallis keeping Sexton quiet one usually strong point for West was subdued.

Shea dashed through to get third goal for West. At the other end Wundersitz performed a similar service for Glenelg after marking cleverly.

Sexton came into the picture with two smart clearances from centre. From the second Soloman forward and Golding goalied.

Wundersitz carried the Glenelg goal tally to double figures, but from then on strong play by the West centre line kept the ball into the forwards. Following and forward, Golding was one of the best for West. He snapped their fifth goal. Kempster missed an easy chance soon afterward.

Hill (Glenelg) was knocked out in a scuffle, necessitating attention from the trainers.

West were doing better by means of their bustling tactics. Glenelg defenders were constantly under pressure, but they held solid. It took a great deal of effort for West to score, but they broke through with goals from Kempster and Dunne. Another goal followed from

Kempster within a short time, thus marking the success of a good West recovery.

Both teams had the ball among their forwards following the bounce in the third quarter, but scrambling play prevented scoring. Then West went in, but Kempster failed badly from an easy position. Soloman and Connell forced the ball in again, and Golding marked brilliantly. His long shot brought the red-and-blacks to within three points of the opposition.

Forcing in from the centre, Link set the bay team in motion. Owens was given a free, but his kick was marked on the goal line.

West were playing better than in the first half. They were meeting the ball and keeping to a policy of long kicking. Shea was continuing to show brilliant form at centre wing, and he forced the ball in repeatedly.

Roused by the closeness of the scores, Glenelg put additional vigor into the play. Rosewarne had a long shot, and Owens shepherded while the ball rolled through the main opening. Bail snapped another goal soon after.

Play was more open than in the earlier stages. West forward line, however, was failing badly. Bail left the field and was replaced by Thompson. The latter signalled his entry by goaling. Even play marked the close of the quarter.

Glenelg were on top in the opening stages of the final quarter. Owens was coming well out to meet the ball, and it was after a great mark by him that Shakes received and goalied.

Four singles in quick succession increased the score. West appeared to be beaten, but they broke away strongly from the centre. Vigorous play in their forward line followed before Dunne found the main opening.

The game had been hard if not anything else. Glenelg were keeping their grip on it by their speed and the marked superiority of Sallis at this stage.

Sexton had faded out since the resumption at half-time, and as West were attempting to find him with their passes the effectiveness of Sallis was pronounced. A goal to Dunne for West marked the close of a hard attack. Glenelg were still full of vigor, and Thompson put on their fifteenth goal.

The scoring rate was kept even by goals from H. Graham and Wundersitz for the respective teams. Link and Owens added goals within five minutes of time.

**INTERESTING** duels were fought between the opposing wingmen at Prospect. Jaffer (South) was too good for Drew in the first half, but the northern flanker played brilliantly thereafter. Mackay again showed that he should have Mckay for North on the other wing, again showed that he should have been included in the State team. Croft, his opponent, showed promise for South, but was overshadowed on the day.

**MANGELSDORF** was awarded the trophy for the best North player today. The performance of Mangelsdorf was particularly gratifying, as he had been unable to strike form in most matches this year. He was stationed at half-back.

**BY** his "bag" of 10 goals against South today, Farmer (North goalsneak) took his tally for the season to 96. He needs only 10 sixers in the last three matches before the finals to eclipse his State record of 105 last season. Although well watched today, he marked and kicked with his usual good judgment.

**CHAPLIN** defended stoutly for South against North. Another hard worker was Masters, who showed his best form on the ball. One of few league footballers to placekick accurately, Gardiner was a useful forward. Hassett was prominent at centre.

**BIDDELL** should develop into a valued defender for Norwood if his play today is an indication of his ability. He cleared with well-timed rushes, and always finished with a telling kick.

**CONNELL** battled hard for West against Glenelg. He bore the brunt of the ruck work. Church was solid without being brilliant.

**TORRENS** ruck is not the tower of strength it was earlier in the season. McKenzie and Bridgman were only fair in the game against Port. Williamson also had a quiet day.

**WAITE** battled hard to get his six goals for Torrens today. He gets little support.

**J. Johnson** got four goals for Port today, all being scored in the third term. Johnson should develop into a good player, but will probably take time to mature. V. Johnson was unusually quiet.

**CHINNERY**, Page, Mitchell, and Johns were a sound quartet of defenders for Norwood. The manner in which they checked repeated Sturt rushes indicated that they will prove a thorn in the side of other teams before the season ends. A weakness in the Norwood defence was that on a number of occasions no one fell back into the goals when Johns went out to guard Morton.

**PONTIFEX** played well for Torrens at centre, being too good for A. Hender in the air. The latter player, however, did well on the ground, and on the day honors were even.

**GOLDING** was the best of the forwards for West against Glenelg. Marking well and kicking accurately, he played practically a lone hand in attack. Dunne was the only other red-and-black forward to show form.

**DAYMAN** is a player that Port could ill afford to lose. Playing mostly on a half-forward flank he generally made good use of the ball when in possession. He scored four goals.

**A SURPRISING** reversal of form was made by Burton (North) against South. He failed at half-back in the first half, but played an excellent second half as follower. Lock was one of the most solid members of the side at centre. Storer was a clever rover and forward, and snapped four smart goals.
