## PORT BEATEN AT ALBERTON

With 11 series of league games completed, the only two teams that can feel sure of a place in the final four are Sturt and Torrens.

Torrens' win over North today was full of merit and was easily the best form of the gold-and-blues for the season. As a result of their win, Torrens displace North from second position. Torrens are strong at many points, but at full forward they are weak. Quinn, a brilliant half-back, does not look the man for the If Foote could be spared from half forward, he would probably get many goals.

On today's form Torrens have as good a chance as any team of pulling off the season's honors.
