GLENELG DROP FIGHT FOR FOUR

REDLEGS' WIN STRENGTHENS THEIR CLAIMS

Farmer Stars Again — 11 Goals

As a result of defeat by Norwood today, Glenelg have dropped out of the fight for a place in the final four. Norwood have a firm grip on fourth place, and Port's chance of ousting them is a very slender one.

Norwood practically won the game against Glenelg in the first quarter. rediegs were supreme in the rucks and held Glenelg, in spite of a strong wind, to s 10-point lead at quarter time. Playing a fine, long-kicking game, Norwood took the lead early in the second term and from then on were not troubled by the opposition.

North scored convincingly from Torrens at the Adelaide Oval. The blue-andgolds never looked dangerous, and were outplayed in every department. Farmer the North full-forward, was again in fine form. He kicked North's first eight goals, and finished with 11. He kicked 16 last Saturday.

Port's accuracy in attack enabled them to win from South in a game that lacked system. Sturt had no trouble to defeat West at Unley. The red-andblacks were very weak.

The association semi-finals were won by Torrens and Port. North will meet Torrens at Norwood on Saturday, and the winners will play Port for the premiership on the following week.
