PORT BEATEN ON BELL IN THRILLING FINISH

West Fail in Desperate Effort to Break Run of Defeats

SEVEN GOALS TO ROSEWARNE

Three of the four league games played today provided exciting encounters, with the result in doubt until well into the last quarter.

At Thebarton the play see-sawed, first Port and then Torrens leading. Neither side was accurate in attack, but the game lacked nothing in vigor. Umpire Raven gave a particularly free interpretation.

Torrens drew level with four minutes of play left, and with only one minute to go got the winning goal.

At Prospect, North were weakened by the absence of Farmer, and West pushed the red-and-whites closely. In the final term West led by 10 points at one stage, but they were unable to withstand North's strong finishing effort.

The Adelaide Oval game was marked by accurate goalkicking. Glenelg's young star, C. Rosewarne, scored another seven goals today, making his total 31 for the season. Glenelg began the final term with a 20-point lead, and won after a well-fought last quarter.

As expected, Sturt were too good for South at Unley, but few expected to see the city team so thoroughly trounced. Winning all along the line, Sturt romped home with a 91-point winning margin.

Glenelg's Second Win

HOLD NORWOOD OFF IN EXCITING LAST TERM

Quick Scoring Thrusts Aid Well-earned Victory

Norwood, on the other hand, were often held up for minutes at a time without scoring. The teams were evenly matched at all points, although Norwood's inaccurate kicking at midfield in the first half gave Glenelg a slight advantage. In the air W. B. McCallum, for Norwood, and G. B. Johnston, for Glenelg, were brilliant.

Much of the effect of Johnston's aerial skill was lost because the Norwood men usually punched the ball when they found the big Glenelg man leaping beside them. McCallum's brilliance in the air in the last quarter nearly snatched victory for Norwood.

Owens won the toss for Glenelg, and kicked towards the Cathedral end, which was favored by a slight breeze.

C. Rosewarne, Glenelg's young full forward, goaled from an acute angle soon after the start, and Biddell, at the other end, evened the tally with a goal from a mark in front.

Soon after, Norwood looked like scoring again when Norwood's high-marking forwards, Biddell, W. B. McCallum, and Krome came into action with a series of good marks. But it was C. Rosewarne at the other end who scored next, marking well about 30 yards in front of goal.

Wundersitz had an open goal before him when the ball went to Glenelg's end again, and he shot truly. Except when Johnston, the Glenelg ruckman, was near, Norwood were shining in the air, but badly directed kicks lost them the advantage that their aerial ability had gained.

Marks by W. B. McCallum and Krome and a free to Biddell in the goalmouth gave Norwood their second goal.

First Quarter

Three quick shots by E. A. Johnson, the red-leg captain, brought goals. The first came after a scramble in front, and the next two were the result of frees.

A length Glenelg worried their way down the field, and Link, dashing at right

angles across goal, kicked the ball off the side of his boot through goal. Then C. Rosewarne got only a point from a fairly easy shot.

Hale made amends soon after with a dazzling dash from the centre. He goaled and put the tigers ahead. A little later Hale left the ground limping, and Stringer came on. The Norwood reserve had already gone on to replace Sisson.

P. McCallum scored with a punt from an angle after he had been freed, and Rosewarne and Link, both scouting into position well, put on two goals for Glenelg.

Half-time

So far Glenelg's two experiments at vital points were working well. Wells was doing well at half-back, and so was Goldsworthy at centre half-forward.

Biddell and McCallum changed places after the interval, and E. G. Johnson and Chinnery moved up. Glenelg replied by sending Stringer, the reserve, to centre half-back, moving Percy to a half-forward flank, and Owens to a forward pocket.

Percy and Owens goaled for Glenelg, and E. A. Johnson and Biddell did the same for Norwood. It was a quarter of brilliant football for both sides.

Rosewarne put on his fourth, and then his fifth goal after a succession of attacks along the right wing.

W. McCallum goaled twice from long shots, and then Sorrell goaled to make Norwood's score the same as the Bay team's.

Third Quarter

The breeze had freshened a little now. A towering mark by W. B. McCallum sent the ball into the goalmouth, but only a point came. Owens put Glenelg further ahead, and after another point, W. B. McCallum, marking between the sticks from a long shot by E. A. Johnson, scored a goal.

W. McCallum was dominating the game whenever the ball went into the redlegs' forward area, and another goal from him put Norwood within eight points of the Bays.

Then Biddell sent the ball in, but Johnston saved by leaping head and shoulders above a pack. After an attack that had lasted for more than five minutes, Norwood lost their chance.

The ball was flashed to the other end, and R. Rosewarne goaled. Another point was added to Glenelg's score before their attack eased up.

Close-ups of League Footballers

GOLDSWORTHY and Percy were often in the picture for Glenelg against Norwood. Both were safe in the air, but often Goldsworthy spoiled his work by bad kicking.

BIDDELL ably assisted W. McCallum on the Norwood half-forward line against Glenelg. His success in the air and his tricky left-foot kicking were features of several Norwood attacks.

G. B. Johnston, the Glenelg ruckman, was the best man against Norwood. All through the match he shone with high marks; occasionally he leapt head and shoulders over the packs to grasp the ball. In the second half his opponents punched the ball whenever he was in the packs to minimise the influence he was exerting on the game.

C. Rosewarne, Glenelg's crack forward, kicked seven goals and one behind against Norwood. He got the ball for himself more often than usual, and marked over Sawley, his opponent, who is some inches taller, at least as often as Sawley marked over him. His one behind came from a position where most people thought that he would have goaled for certain.

SNELL played a fine game for West at centre, although his youthful opponent, Wright, performed moderately well against such a skilful footballer. Connell, the West skipper, often showed to good effect as a follower.

STATIONED at centre, G. Headon played consistently good football throughout the Sturt-South encounter at Unley.

PONTIFEX marked in sensational style for Torrens against Port. His splendid marking was offset by a tendency to run too far. Torrens held the balance of power across the centre, because Perkins outclassed Mucklow. On the other wing Shepherd and Dermody each played brilliant football, the former doing better in the first three terms, while Dermody was a leading figure in most of Port's dashes in the final term.

READ, at centre half-back, stood out as Torrens' best man. Marking safely, Read was clever on the ground, and always delivered the ball well out of danger. Conroy and Adcock played well for Torrens at full back and Downs, who played in Quinn's place after half-time, showed promise.

GOALKICKING was at a discount at Thebarton. The only player to make good use of his opportunities was Robertson, who secured four goals for Port largely as a result of cool sharking in the forward lines.

PORT'S small men—R. Quinn, Hooper, and N. Hender—were among the best against Torrens. Quinn bids fair to emulate the dashing deeds of his brother, formerly of Port and now of Geelong (Vic.). J. Allingham, the star of Port's defence today, also comes into the side with the performances of his brother, M. Allingham, as an incentive.
