## TEAMS IN THE FIRST FOUR STRENGTHEN POSITIONS

## South Nearly Snatch Victory From Unbeaten League Leaders

## MUNRO'S 19 GOALS IN TWOGAMES

Victories to Sturt, Norwood, North, and Torrens in today's league games left the leading four unchanged. Port and Glenelg, who are three and four points respectively behind the fourth team. Torrens, may find difficulty in making up Sturt still remain unbeaten with a clear lead of five points over Norwood, the second team on the list.

Sturt's high marking saved them against South, who were beaten by only seven points after an exciting game. The blue-and-whites extended the leaders to the utmost, but inability to overcome Sturt at half-back in the last quarter cost Munro again excelled at full-forward. He kicked nine goals, making his tally for two league games 19. This, with 39 in association matches, brings his total to 58 for the season,

Deadly kicking for goal by Torrens in the last quarter gave them a comfortable win over Port at Thebarton. Eight goals were scored from 10 scoring shots by the blue-and-golds in the last term. Port, although hampered by a ruck breakdown, made a brilliant recovery in the third term, but were unable to maintain their form in the face of Torrens' accuracy in attack.

West staged a thrilling third quarter recovery against North at Wayville. Another great burst in the last quarter after a bad start just failed to carry the red-and-blacks to victory. North won because of surer handling of the ball and bursts of exhilarating system. Mattiske, the West full-back, played brilliantly in checking Farmer in the last quarter.

Norwood staged a great fighting finish to beat Glenelg at the Bay oval. They countered Glenelg's fast ground work with fine high marking and strong play at centre and half-forward. C. Rosewarne failed at full forward for Glenelg, but Owens once more came to the rescue with seven well-earned goals.
