Torrens Go Down to Sturt: Norwood's Exciting Win on Bell

11 GOALS KICKED BY OWENS

Glenelg seem certain to play in the finals as a result of their big victory over South in league football today. Port, West, and North are fighting for the fourth position, and by virtue of their easier programme for the remaining matches Port appear likely to gain fourth place, with Torrens, Sturt, and Glenelg as the other three teams.

North will have to win all of their four remaining matches—a remote possibility—to make their inclusion certain, while West's poor percentage may influence their exclusion.

Producing brilliant football, Sturt overwhelmed Torrens in the first term, to build up a lead of 46 points, while the blue-and-golds failed to score. A return to form in the second term saw Torrens fight back strongly, but they failed by six points to overtake the double-blues.

In an exciting finish Norwood kicked a goal on the bell to defeat North by three points. A dazzling second quarter by the redlegs in which they scored 7-3 to 0-3, was responsible for their victory.

Superior pace and greater understanding in the first half resulted in Port defeating West. Showing more dash and system than South, Glenelg overwhelmed the blue-and-whites after half-time, and registered the biggest victory of the day.

RUNAWAY WIN TO GLENELG

GLENELG recorded a runaway victory over South at the Adelaide Oval, having 94 points to spare at the finish. The seaiders outpaced South and were far too good for them in the air and at the goalfront. Owens kicked 11 goals.

Jacka replaced Rosewarne in the Glenelg team. Winning the toss, South kicked first towards the cathedral end, which was slightly favored by a cross breeze.

Glenelg showed more dash in the opening stages, Owens smartly snapping the first goal on the run. Getting into their stride, the city men goaled through Murdy, but two more attacks petered out after feeble kicking.

Owens scored Glenelg's second goal, but when South broke through again they lost a valuable opportunity by faulty shooting.

Proving too elusive for the South defenders, Glenelg increased their lead to 12 points when Cornelius added another goal for the seaiders. South improved their mid-field play, but Cockburn was the only South defender doing well. The city team was failing persistently in distant kicking.

Mason cleverly screw-kicked an angle goal for them right on the bell. Just before that Leak had goaled for Glenelg.

An unexpected goal came from South when Munro marked a feeble kick-off from Whitaker and shot truly. South were matching it fairly evenly, but Glenelg were superior in the air.

A remarkable feature of the next five minutes' play was that the ball struck a goalpost four times, each team doing this twice. Munro made the scores equal with his second goal.

Owens, Leak, and Link gave Glenelg a comfortable lead with further goals. Rallying their forces, South worked their way forward by systematic play, and Mason brought up his team's fifth goal.

When Glenelg secured a four-goal advantage in goals from Link and Wells, the Bays were winning in nearly all departments.

From several thrusts South could produce only singles; they had lapsed into their forward errors again, only five goals coming from 17 scoring shots.

Owens at the other end kicked Glenelg's thirteenth and his fifth goal. Again the champion forward defeated the South goalkeeper, and his sixth goal went up. Glenelg were now 54 points to the good. A minute later Owens cleverly snapped another goal.

On top everywhere, Glenelg again added full points, this time Link being responsible. Glenelg had piled on 7-6 against four points by South in a one-sided quarter.

Glenelg swept forward and Leak increased their lead to 74 point with another goal.

Link sent up the nineteenth Glenelg goal, and then Owens added full points for the tenth time.

Once again Owens shot truly, and Edwards followed with another. Johnston ended a tame match by putting Glenelg 100 points in front with the twenty-third goal.

Owens added a single, and when play swung to the other end Rusby scored a belated goal for South.

Stab Kicks And Flick Passes

HICKMAN played a brilliant game for Norwood, and was the best man on the ground. His work on a half-forward flank in the first half was invaluable. In the second half he effectively silenced the North centreman, Knuckey, who until then had dominated the mid-field play.

SHUTTLEWORTH played a leading part in Sturt's brilliant first quarter at Unley. His dash, allied with strong marking ability, makes him an ideal ruckman. He also played well when placed forward, kicking two goals.

P. F. and W. B. McCallum recorded their best games for the season against North at Norwood. P. F. McCallum rucked tirelessly, and played a great part in Norwood's recovery. W. B. McCallum marked brilliantly at centre half-forward, and kicked strongly.

TULLY and Rusby roved cleverly for South, although they were not so prominent as the Glenelg scouts. Rusby, who has had little league experience, shows distinct promise.

EASILY South's best man against Glenelg was Cockburn. This vigorous player showed skill and determination in defence, and enhanced his claims to interstate honors. His go-through tactics got the blues out of many a tight corner, but he received little support.

PONTIFEX marked his return to Torrens with a good exhibition at Unley. His high marking and accurate kicking were features of the latter stages of the game.

OBST played a sterling game at half-back for Port. Sure in his marking, he was the mainstay of the Port defence, and held up West single handed in the first quarter.

OWENS was at the peak of his form for Glenelg against South, scoring 11 goals. He was particularly deadly in the second half. Owens marked brilliantly, and his left-foot screw kicking was nearly always accurate.

## DOUBT STILL CLOUDS FINAL FOUR PLACINGS

### Bays Only One Point Behind Leaders, Following Today's Win

#### CLOSE TUSSLE FOR LAST PLACE

The victories scored in today's league football by Port, West, Glenelg, and North threw little light on the likely composition of the final four. Torrens and Sturt are practically certain of inclusion, and Glenelg, Port, West, and North are fighting for the third and fourth positions.

A fine victory by Glenelg over Norwood places Glenelg only one point behind the two leading teams, Torrens and Sturt, both of whom were defeated today—by Port and West respectively.

Norwood are now definitely out of the fight, and Port and West have a slight call over North, because of an extra two points. Glenelg are playing well enough to make their inclusion probable, but the last position is likely to be in doubt until the conclusion of the minor round.

Port's superior stamina in the closing 10 minutes enabled them to snatch victory from Torrens after they appeared to be beaten.

West scored a convincing victory at Unley, where Sturt's big men let them down badly. The Unley men's lack of determination and vigor in their back lines was pronounced.

After an evenly fought three quarters against Norwood Glenelg produced their best form in the last term and clinched victory with a fine burst. After a series of defeats North struck form against South, who were overwhelmed. Farmer kicked 10 goals for North.

Both teams began uncertainly, misjudging the ball and kicking poorly. Glenelg moved in vigorously, but met solid resistance, and Norwood rattled them with quick goals from Krome and Brown.

Wells and Edwards held them at bay for a time, but Brown broke through with his second goal from a lightning snap. Glenelg's first goal came from Owens, who sent screw punt through from a long way out.

The redlegs drove in relentlessly, but their early accuracy had deserted them and five singles came up.

When Johnston (Glenelg) flew high to intercept a shot by Link, he missed and the ball bounced through for a goal.

A beautiful flying mark by Hill cleared the next Norwood onslaught, and fine, combined play carried the bays into the goal mouth, where Owens brought down a fine mark and kicked accurately.

A few minutes before the bell Brown (Norwood) capped a strong dash with full points.

With promise of a close finish, both teams leapt into the game energetically. Winning in the air and faster to the ball, Glenelg raced in, and Percy and Goldsworthy goaled within a few minutes.

Another systematic burst took them in again, and Percy kicked a great goal from a half-forward wing, giving his team a great start on the road to victory.

Norwood retaliated with a fiercely sustained offensive, which brought a goal from Schultz—his sixth. Glenelg took charge again immediately, and Owens from a wonderful snap and Percy and Goldsworthy from marks close in, raised both flags, and made the game safe for the bays.

Strong work by P. McCallum, Bice, and O'Brien gave the redlegs several chances, but a persistent peppering of the Glenelg defence brought only a goal from Krome and singles from Brown, O'Brien, Huxtable, Brown, and Schultz in that order.

SCHULTZ was in excellent form for Norwood, and fully earned his tally of six goals. He showed keen determination in the face of strong foiling.
