## MAGAREY MEDAL **PROPECTS**

## Task for Umpires

(By Steve McKee)

The selection of the Magarey Medallist is an interesting feature of every season, and with the qualifying round ending on Saturday umpires will complete their allotment of votes which will decide the 1934 recipient.

"Fairest and most brilliant." Can umpires adjudicate correctly? . I think not.

The present method of awarding the Magarey medal is not ideal. Field umpires have a task demanding intense concentration in controlling game, one that definitely will not permit them accurately to assess comparative skill in most cases. Occasionally a player is outstanding in a game, allowing umpires to make a simple choice, but only occasionally. In most games there are several players closely awarded, and umpires cannot reason- been a success in this regard. ably be expected to sort the men out in correct order from the welter of incident that occurs.

Subscribing to the view that impressions gained during the latter stages of a game will in most cases cause umpires to forget the brilliance of players in the first half strengthens the contention that the present method could be improved upon.

Umpires should record their preferences at the end of each quarter to guard against this happening, and make a final choice after the game's ending.

Early brilliance would not then be entirely overlooked, as is probable at present, and it would be a simple and inexpensive matter for the league to effect this improvement, while maintaining the present desirable secrecy of umpires' decisions.

While claiming that the system is imperfect, it cannot be doubted that the originator of the award, the late Mr. W. A. Magarey, rendered the game a great service when he conceived the idea of encouraging fair and brilliant play 37 years ago. Many famous football names are included in the list.

Followers, rovers, centres, and halfbacks have monopolised the honor. No player permanently stationed in attack has ever won a Magarey Medal.

Farmer created a new Australian goalgetting record in 1931 through a series of particularly brilliant efforts, but he did not win the Magarey Medal.

## MOST PUZZLING FINAL ROUND IN FOOTBALL HISTORY

## Fight for "Four" at All Ovals

The most intriguing qualifying round in the history of league football will reach a thrilling climax on Saturday. The composition of the "final four" will depend upon results at Alberton, Norwood, Unley, and Prospect.

Torrens are certain of inclusion, and Sturt, having to face South at Unley, can be safely rated as semi-finalists. But there the certainty ends.

Fully seized with the importance of improving their "percentage," Port strained every nerve to record the most decisive win of the season against South at Adelaide Oval last Saturday, but in spite of their colossal winning margin the magpies cannot afford to lose at Alberton in their final qualifying engagement.

North's record in match points is so manning close to that of the magpies that the combination of a three-goal defeat of Port and a five-goal winning margin to North will drop Port to fifth position if Sturt and Glenelg also succeed.

A similar state of affairs obtains in connection with Glenelg and West. Should Glenelg be beaten by three goals at Norwood, and West defeat North by a similar margin at Prospect, West will secure fourth position.

Port's smashing defeat of South, following immediately upon the latter's sensational overthrow of Torrens, suggests that the magpies will comfortably account for the gold-and-blues on Saturday. If Port win they will deprive Torrens of top position, to which they have clung practically throughout the whole of the qualifying round.

Port's form has been so solid during the past month, with younger players like Hollingworth, Yates, Quinn, West, and Obst playing fine football, that they must be rated as formidable contenders for the 1934 premiership.
