## FARMER'S 13 GOALS BEST TOTAL SO FAR

### Brilliant Last-Minute Goal Forces Draw at Wayville

## GLENELG'S FIRST VICTORY

The features of today's league football games were a marked improvement by North, who soundly defeated Norwood and jumped to second place on the premiership list, and a return to top form by Port. The magpies at full strength will be hard to defeat.

Accurate kicking and brilliant high marking by the forwards gave North victory over Norwood. Farmer showed a return to championship form by kicking 13 goals—the highest day's tally for the season.

Port and West staged a thrilling draw at Wayville. After half-time sparkling football was witnessed, with the fortunes of the game changing repeatedly in the last term.

Consistency in the air and on the ground for three terms, and a dazzling burst in the last quarter gave Glenelg a well deserved victory over South. It was Glenelg's first win for the season.

## Close-Ups of Players

**HOLLINGSWORTH** (Port) shows decided promise of developing into a half-forward of class. Determination and strong aerial work characterised his play.

**TONKIN** was the best man for West at Wayville. He revelled in the vigorous exchanges, and always disposed of the ball to advantage.

**BICE** again played up to form on a centre flank for Norwood. His efforts, particularly in the first half, kept open a path for many redleg thrusts. His pace, allied with neat marking and advantageous disposal, were features of his play.

**A. J. S. Chinnery** played soundly on a half-back flank for Norwood. Page also handled the ball frequently, but could have disposed of it to better advantage. Burton, who gave a fine display when rucking for North, was capably checked by Page, who took over the key defence position for the redlegs after half-time.

**BROCK**, the youthful Glenelg centre half-forward, recorded his best game for the season against South. His six goals were the result of exceptionally dashing work.

**GRIFFITHS** defended for Glenelg in a dashing style, effectively subduing M. Murdy, Wells and James were also in good form.

**AGAINST** strong opposition from Johnston and Percy, Rose played an outstanding defensive game for South. His marking was particularly good.



**FARMER** gave a phenomenal display. Although he missed a long way from the posts at times he scored 13 goals. Three Norwood players opposed him a turn, but most failed to check his high marking and clean leading out. His kicking was most accurate, only three shots missing the big opening.

Handling the ball more surely and leading out well, Glenelg posted a brace of goals from Brock and Link in as many minutes. Dashing play by Link was the main factor in their success.

When H. Forrester goaled for South and Link again for the bays four goals straight had been scored.

Then Rusby had two shots for South and hit a post each time. Breaking down in attack, Glenelg put on four singles in a row.

Recovering strongly, South dashed in, and M. Murdy and H. Forrester quickly raised both flags.

Effective system carried Glenelg in again, however, and Brock piloted the ball through after a fierce goalmouth scuffle. A minute later Colyer raced in like a hare and kicked truly at point-blank range.

South regained the lead with goals from Tully and Munro just before the bell.

## Torrens Tipped To Beat Sturt

If Simpson is able to take his place in the Torrens side against Sturt on Monday the blue-and-golds will field their strongest team with the exception of Read who is out of action with an injured leg.

The early doubt about the strength of the Torrens opening ruck has been dispelled by the fine form shown by Duthie and Coulter, who played like veterans in their initial league encounter.

The transfer of Pontifex to centre-forward has strengthened the blue-and-golds' attack. This has given them added power at goal front, which the Sturt half-backs will find difficult to deal with.

Although Sturt appear to be gradually returning to their form of last season, I expect Torrens to be too fast and systematic on the open spaces of the Adelaide Oval.
