# MEN WON **Brilliant In Third Term**

Victoria opened the game in systematic style, and were rewarded with a goal from Forbes.

It was early evident that Victoria would not attempt to pick up the ball from a scrimmage; they gave South Australia a lead in opening the game by kicking off the ground.

Johnston excelled in the air, and was the outstanding player in the home team. South Australia attacked often. but their early play in the forward lines lacked the decision and nippiness shown by the Victorian forwards
