Torrens and Glenely treated the spectators to a dazzling exhibition of football in the first half. Showing superior pace in the third term, Torrens raced away with a strong lead, and although Glenelg fought back in the last quarter, they could not break through the strong Torrens defence.

Kicking with remarkable accuracy, Sturt defeated North by six points. Whereas Farmer, the North crack, kicked badly, Morton, the Sturt full forward, scored seven goals from eight shots.

Outclassing Norwood in the air and beating them in the race to the ball, West overwhelmed the redlegs. After the first change the red-and-blacks seldom looked in danger of defeat.
