Umpire's Blunder Costs Port Goal PROSPECT DISPUTE

On the actual scores at the finish of the game. North should have had one goal less than the number recorded. With the scores level in the second quarter. North forced the ball through to Farmer. The North captain was hard pressed, and he ran to the left of the nortehrn goal. As he turned to elude an opponent the boundary umpire signalled "out of bounds."

But the play went on, and the boundary umpire ran on the field to central umpire Thomas. The boundary official spoke to the man in charge as Farmer sent the ball through the goal. A goal was signalled, and the umpire had the ball brought back to the centre and bounced.

The ball was signalled "out bounds" before Farmer kicked it, and the central umpire blundered badly in allowing the score. He should have cancelled the score and had the ball thrown in at the point where it had gone out of bounds.

The umpiring all through was of a most unsatisfactory nature. It was impossible to follow the decisions of the field umpire.

The worst patch was in the last 10 minutes. With both teams fighting hard there were breaches of the rules galore, but very few free kicks. Pushing in the back, "legging," and throwing the man were allowed to go unnoticed.

It would be a liberal estimate to place the number of free kicks given for holding the ball at no more than five for the whole of the game.

TRICKY OVAL

Drastic changes were made in the positions of the Glenelg men after halftime. The wingmen changed places, Fischer went from half-forward left half-back left, Richter went from halfback right to centre half-forward, and Curnow because of his injury was moved to a forward pocket.

Whether or not the improvement could be attributed to these alterations. Glenelg certainly had a much bigger share of the play in the last two quarters than they had had in the second term.
