Bays Down Norwood in First Win for Year

Deciding Goal As Bell Rings

SOUTH SCORE ON SODDEN CITY OVAL

Sturt Now in Four

Glenelg today ended their sequence of league football defeats—20 of them since they defeated Torrens on June 1 last year—by scrambling home from Norwood by four points. A mark as the bell rang paved the way for the goal that gave them victory.

North's forward inaccuracy contributed to the defeat by South at Adelaide. In the first half North scored only five goals from 13 shots, but in the last two terms they kicked 7—3.

Torrens started brilliantly against Sturt at Unley, but faded so badly that Sturt romped away to a hollow victory. As a result the double-blues have now ousted North from the four.

Kick 40 Yards Out Ends Glenelg's Bad Run

Eatts Chaired Off Ground After Goal

In a game of changing fortunes, ending in a dramatic and thrilling climax, Glenelg wrested their first victory for the season from Norwood today at the Bay Oval. The seaisiders had too much dash in the closing 10 minutes of play—10 exciting minutes—as they gradually overhauled the redleg score to be two points in arrears. Then Eatts marked the ball 40 yards out as the final bell rang.

Time and again during the closing minutes it appeared that Glenelg must get the goal they so desired. Several times the ball swept past the goalmouth and the Norwood defenders cleared.

Fate, a steady nerve, and an accurate kick by Eatts decided the fortune of the game. There was a hush among the spectators as he went back from his mark for the kick that would mean defeat or victory, and a tremendous shout as the ball passed between the goalposts.

Glenelg officials were almost in a delirium of joy at their first win. Eatts' colleagues carried him shoulder high from the ground and every Bay man got a pat on the back as he walked off the field through the crowd.

BIG POOL OF WATER

The match was unusual in the manner in which the rival teams dominated the alternate quarters. The first and third terms were Norwood's and the second and the last were definitely Glenelg's.

A sodden ground and a strong southerly breeze, which dropped slightly after the first quarter, affected the standard of play, but both teams adapted themselves well to the conditions after the opening term. The northern part of the field was waterlogged over a big area. A pool of water about 30 square yards in area was a severe disadvantage about 40 yards out from the northern goal.

Norwood opened strongly. With neither side revealing any indication of good, solid play the redlegs battled determinedly and held a 33-point lead at the first change-over. Glenelg had to kick against the wind this quarter.

Accurate passing and generally improved play in the second term enabled the seaisiders to overtake their opponents, and by vigorous tactics convert a 33-point deficit to a two-point lead by half-time. Glenelg combined nicely in this quarter, and deserved to be in front at the long interval.

EXCITING END

Playing determinedly, the redlegs were definitely superior in the third term and posted 8—4 to Glenelg's 1—3. More accurate midfield passing and surer handling of the ball were features of Norwood's play in this term.

The switching of Woodroofs from full back to the ruck influenced the redlegs' game greatly, and their persistent attacks on goal brought full reward.

Woodroofs continued on the ball in

the last quarter, but the seaisiders finished too strongly and kept their opponents down to 2—2 for the term. For the greater part of the quarter, the Bay men were on the offensive. Tugwell shone for Norwood in this term. But for his fine work in defence Glenelg would have secured the coveted goal well before the final bell.

Intense excitement reigned as the fate of the game hung in the balance. Several times Norwood cleared at the critical moment, and swept the ball upfield, but the Glenelg defenders averted the danger and once again Glenelg hammered the Norwood defence.

The finish was a fitting climax to a match the result of which upset all league expectations.

Glenelg scored only their second win since they won the league premiership in 1934, when they upset all calculations by downing Norwood today.

Glenelg officials are elated at their success, and Mr. S. Brooks, a committee member, said tonight that now the Bays had turned the long corner, today's win would not be their last.

Glenelg's win was celebrated in the clubroom after the match, when the chairman of the club (Mr. C. G. Tolley) made a monetary gift to each player. Special prizes given by Mr. E. Rix for the four best players went to Griffiths, Brock, Link, and Percy.

Farmer Nears State Record

Farmer, playing his eighth season for North, scored six goals against South today. This brings his total to 813 goals for the red-and-whites.

With seven matches still to be played in the minor round, and a possibility of inclusion in the semi-finals, Farmer appears certain to break the South Australian record of 826 goals scored by Jack Owens, who played for 10 years with Glenelg.

League Close-Ups

LEAVING the defence of the goalmouth to F. P. McCallum for the last half of the game, Woodroofs went on the ball for two quarters against Glenelg, and his fine play assisted the redlegs considerably.

PLAYING his first league game, Klabe fully justified his promotion from the B Grade ranks by his smart play in the forward division for Norwood. His kicking was remarkably accurate, and he had six goals to his credit at the end of the day.

HUNT was outstanding for Glenelg. For the first three quarters of the game against Norwood he had the call over W. G. McCallum, who occupied the centre half-back position in the final term.

GRIFFITHS showed all-round brilliance for Glenelg. He gave a fine performance back and on the wing, and his splendid work in the last term was a big factor in Glenelg's thrilling win.

PERCY, the Glenelg captain, who has been remarkably consistent this season, again showed his dependability today. He played a solid game in ruck, and scored five goals while stationed in a forward position.

M. Waite did well for Torrens. He rose to brilliant heights in the first quarter, when his straight kicking and position play made him the best man on the ground.

BICE marked his fiftieth league game for Norwood by giving a good display on the wing in the match against Glenelg. He was opposed, however, by Griffiths, who was in top form today, and the Bay man had the call over his opponent most of the time.

AFTER a mediocre start, Port settled down to fine football to overwhelm West, whom they defeated by 82 points at Thebarton—a neutral ground—where the match had been transferred from Wayville Showgrounds.

WEBBER'S display against Port justified his inclusion in the State team. He marked safely and cleared with a good kick when opportunity came his way.

QUINN was seen in a new role for Port in the last quarter, when he was posted on a half-back wing. He took the place of R. H. Quinn, who left the field with a leg. Quinn proved his versatility by maintaining the fine game he had played when roving and forward.

SCOTT played well as the first rover for Torrens. He worked with great dash on the ruck fringes, and received fine support from McLoughlin.

BLIGHT was well in the picture for Torrens when he replaced Filsell after half-time. He held the centre half-forward post for them for the remainder of the game.

LONGMORE and Wundersitz were two of the best men for Sturt against Torrens. Each of the men kicked six goals, and their general play was in keeping with their goal-scoring.

FROGLEY played a lion-hearted game for Torrens at Unley. He was under pressure for practically the whole of the game, but he fought on to the finish. Some of his dashing clearances had the crowd on tip-toe.

ONE of the best men for Norwood was Hancock. He played a particularly effective game on the wing, and was full of running at the finish.
