The game was fought out in pouring rain for the greater part of the time, but the pace hardly slackened. The only effect of the rain was to hamper the highfliers.

Fiercely fought crushes had the crowd on tip-toe throughout the last half, and Umpire Raven contributed to the scrimmages by not calling the ball up to award frees more frequently than he should have.

Making the most of their opportunities in the forward line. Sturt were easily the better side in the first half It was apparent early in the game that Gleneig could not match the Sturt trio across centre.

Then the weight of the Glenelg rucks told on the opposition. ston led the Bay packs in fine style, and it was mainly through his great work that Glenelg were able to put on three goals in one burst.

Glenelg held a 12-point lead halfway through the first quarter, but they were lagging behind for the remainder of the play before half-time.

FLICK PASS USED

This game was remarkable for the extent to which handball was used. Both teams used the flick pass to advantage, and Umpire Raven wisely allowed many border-line passes to go

The Sturt rucks took a firm grip on the play in the second term, and with their centres holding sway, the doubleblues went ahead to a good lead.

Fine position play by Longmore was a big factor in Sturt gaining control. At one stage Sturt put on 40 points while Glenelg were adding a single.

Glenelg made three changes across centre before half-time. They replaced Hunt by Richter early in the second quarter, and placed Cornelius on the pivot to oppose Day.

Glenelg made a brilliant recovery in the third quarter. With their rucks leading them in fine style they gave a remarkable exhibition of straight kicking with the heavy ball. Sturt paced it with the Bay side every inch of the way, but the honors for the term were definitely with Glenelg.

INTENSE EXCITEMENT
