FORWARD WEAKNESS

Glenelg's fine play throughout the match gave mem many opportunities, but their forwards were unable to capitalise them to the full. Had the Bay team been stronger in the forward division their victory would have been by a much greater margin.

South combined well at times, but their team work was not sustained. Glenelg were completely

over their opponents at many stages of the game, and showed brilliance that any team in the fight for the premiership would have found difficult to counter. Both sides played vigorously through-

out. There was plenty of hard bumping. Glenelg had the better of the aerial duels, and the speed of their ground play often left South standing. Except for occasional flashes and good individual play, it was a poor display taken all through by South.
