PORT'S win over Glenelg at Glenelg was due only to their superior dash in the third quarter and the fact that they had a little more stamina than their opponents in the last 10 minutes.

Glenelg were certainly not disgraced on today's display. They were on equal terms with Port for the greater part of the match.

However, their third-quarter lapse, when they were inclined to spoil their team mates and allow the opposition to dash in, take possession of the ball and play it on quickly, was most costly.

It was only during this stage that the bay men were decisively beaten. Although they made a gallant attempt to retrieve the game. Port had taken full advantage of their temporary weakness.

ATROCIOUS KICKING

Contrary to expectations, Glenelg had more of the game in the first half, and but for a weakness forward, should have left the field at half-time with a handy lead. However, atrocious kicking by the forwards mitigated against their superiority elsewhere. Shot after shot went astray.

Perhaps the tricky cross wind had some bearing on this defect, but what appeared to be simple opportunities for maximum scoring were missed.

The outstanding pair for Port were West and Obst, whose sterling defensive play was a feature of the match. The former was much too strong for Birrell when it came to man-to-man encounters. Obst dominated the half-back line.

One of the few Glenelg weaknesses apparent in the individual tussles was the full-back position, where Elsden was too slow in starting to cope efficiently with Prideaux. After having spoiled his opponent from marking, Elsden did not follow up quickly enough to clear effectively.

CENTRE STRENGTHENED

Port did not at any time develop that system which has won previous matches for them. They gave only occasional flashes of combined play. Their best effort in this direction was when they got into their stride after half-time to add six goals to only two scored by Glenelg.

The magpies reshuffled positions at this stage, but I believe it was due only to an injury to Eden, and not because of a weakness anywhere. Bampton replaced Eden in defence, and Johnson went to centre.

Johnson did excellently in his new position, and decidedly strengthened Port's centre line. Seeley was outclassing Dermody on a flank, and the change evened the midfield battles. Praise must be given to Harford for his courageous effort at centre for Glenelg. He did not cover much ground, but was most effective when the ball came his way.

EXPERIMENT FAILS

Usually one of the magpies' strongest followers. Reval was much below form. Rarely was he able to do anything right. Glenelg held their own in the packs except perhaps in the closing stages, when the Port rovers seemed to have more dash.
