Staving off Norwood just before the bell, Sturt brightened their prospects of contesting the league football finals with an eight point win at Unley today. As a result Norwood drop to third place on the premiership list and Sturt are now only two points behind North.

Torrens never looked like finishing in front of South. They played improved football in the second half after having been overshadowed in the first two quarters.

AFTER having indicated in the second quarter that they might secure their first win for the season, Glenelg had to accept defeat again today. They were unable to cope with the great finishing burst by West in the match at the showgrounds. The red-and-blacks by systematic and vastly superior play doubled their goal tally in the last term to score by 27 points.

Glenelg had no reply to West's superior play in the last term. They made several changes, but they were ineffectual, and the result of the match was never in doubt towards the end. The red-and-blacks could do nothing wrong. Accurate kicking for goal and in midfield and clever passing swept them to the front, and they relentlessly drove home their advantage.

The Bay team was unable to cope with the fast ground play of the West men. Except in the second quarter, the red-and-blacks beat their opponents to the ball, and were always in front in the race for possession. Only in the second term were Glenelg able to overcome the stout West defence, and then principally through the efforts of Birrell, who secured his four goals in this quarter.

CONDITION OF GROUND

Inaccurate kicking let West down badly for three quarters of the game. But for this fault they would have been in front at the end of the third term.

Bad patches on the ground affected play considerably. Players were averse to bouncing the ball on these patches, and many spills occurred through the insecure foothold.

There was not a great deal to choose between the teams in the first quarter. Both defences were called upon, and responded well. West would have gone farther ahead but for the work of Percy, James, and Brock. The midfield exchanges were fairly even. The red-and-blacks began better than the Bay men, who have been late starters

in all their matches this season. The standard of play was not impressive in this quarter.

Glenelg were definitely the better side in the second term, and revealed their best form for the match. Their play was characterised by sound, systematic work. Accurate midfield passing was a feature. The Bay men were slightly superior in the air this quarter and surer in their ground play. The high marking of Johnston was a contributing factor to their success.

Towards the end of the term West began to reveal a better system, but lost many opportunities in the third quarter. Each side posted 2—5 this term. Glenelg were unable to reproduce their second-quarter form, while poor kicking forward robbed West of full results from their efforts.

KICKING IMPROVES

Opening with a fine burst after the last change-over, West forged ahead. Their kicking was in marked contrast to their earlier form. On the other hand, Glenelg's kicking was most ineffectual. Many of their midfield passes went astray. The Bay men would do nothing right. A single was their only score until the last minute of the match, when they posted two goals.

STURT downed Norwood in a brilliant game at Unley Oval today. It was a game packed with thrills from start to finish, and with the result in doubt until the final bell.
