Although their goalshooting was badly astray at times, South were never seriously troubled in winning by 34 points against Glenelg.

Stronger at most points, the blueand-whites went ahead right from the start, and had it not been for their faulty kicking in the second quarter (2-10) they would have held a com-manding lead at the long interval instead of a credit balance of only 12 points at that stage.

Glenelg played a plucky game throughout, particularly in the third term, when they were on top, but they failed to last out the distance, and the last quarter saw South scoring almost at will.

The blues impressed as the more solid side, and, while they lacked the dash of their opponents at times, they thoroughly deserved their first win since the match against Sturt three weeks ago.

EARLY GOAL South had a goal on the board within a minute of the first bounce. Showing more system than Glenelg. they forged ahead with further sixers from Dawes (twice) and Moyle. The seasiders in the meantime had opened their goal account with full points from Halliday, who was in the thick

of the fray throughout the quarter. Confronted by a leeway of 16 points when they began the second term, Glenelg tried Boyle at centre halfforward instead of Goodwin.

However, South had most of the play, and it was during this period that they wasted many chances by shocking kicking for goal.

South's half-forwards usually had the call over the tigers, but the poor goal shooting resulted in the scores Glenelg had keeping fairly even. only six scoring shots during the second quarter, but their straight shooting gave them 4—2. On the other hand, South's 2—10 during this term threatened to prove a costly series of blunders.

Twice in the third quarter, Glenelg, by brilliant bursts, looked like going to the front. They handled the ball much more surely than in the first half. and also flew successfully with South. Their leading out, too, was most serviceable, but drizzling rain and a poor light now began to interfere with the game as a spectacle.

OFF THE TARGET

Glenelg's kicking for goal was off the target this time, and the quarter brought them 4-7 against 4-1 by

Glenelg needed only seven points to pass their rivals when the last term began. The ball was greasy, however, and their handling was much less sure than in the third quarter.

South adopted tear-through tactics in the closing stages. They finished with greater stamina than Glenelg, and pinned the home team down to three points for the quarter.
