Torrens' Superior Stamina

The greater stamina shown by West Torrens from half-way through the third quarter, and superior ability to adapt itself to the wet conditions under which the closing stages of the match were played, were factors which contributed towards its success at the expense of Glenelg, at Glenelg Oval, on Saturday. The home team more than held its own in the first half, but against West Torrens's more vigorous tactics towards the end of the match, it was unable to fulfil its earlier promise.

A slight superiority in the air, and greater speed on 'he ground, combined with more expeditious disposal of the ball, gave Glenelg the advantage in the first 10 minutes of rather scrambly play. When the game opened up, however, West Torrens, flying high and employing handball with good effect, established a definite advantage, which it maintained until a few minutes before the first quarter ended, when Johnston, shooting smartly from an acute angle, gave Glenelg the lead once more.

Although the fairly even rate of scoring which had marked the first quarter was maintained in the second, the home team had the better of the play until towards the end of the term. Gleneig invariably won in the race to the ball, and it frequently showed pleasing flashes of combination play. Its handball, of which it had made little use in the first of West Torrens. One of the outstanding instances of the value of the judicious use of the hand pass during the match was when Halltday, finding himself in a tight corner, passed to Johnston, who flicked the ball to Lush, and the lastnamed put on a goal. Although West Torrens fought hard, its efforts, until halftime drew near, for the greater part lacked the co-ordination which Glenelg's attacks possessed.

Relying rather too much on the use of handball. West Torrens lost many opportunities for effective disposal of the ball in the early stages of the third quarter. Largely due to this weakness, there was little to choose between the apparent strength of the two teams until the term was half spent. Turning Point In Game

That marked the turning point in the fortunes of West Torrens. It levelled the scores, then, playing vizorously, continued to hurl itself at Glenelg's defences. Although the home team stuck gamely to its task, it was outplayed in practically every department. Rain which began to fall appeared to have less effect upon West Torrens than upon the home side. West Torrens held a lead of 17 points when Foote put on his fifth goal in a row, and Kinlough followed almost immediately afterwards

with another. There was a brief respite from the rain in the last quarter, but about half-way through the term a heavy fall set in, and gloves were taken out to the players. Glenelg was only a shadow of itself, compared with its display in the first half. West Torrens appeared to be less handicapped by the rain, and it obviourly possessed greater stamina. quarter was well advanced. Glenele added its first goal since early in the previous term. Foote Outstanding

West Torrens's outs'anding performer was Poote, who, playing in a forward pocket, scored six well-earned goals. He showed judgment in making position, and kicked with extreme accuracy. Mullins, at centre halfforward, was a useful ally to Thiele at centre in the West Torrens attacks. He marked well, and used his weight to advantage. Kinlough, who was playing for West Torrens again after a season with the Amateur League, added strength to the attack in the full forward position, although Ahrendt set behinds; A. McLeun, 3 goals I behind; War- up stern opposition in the first half. Juttburst, 2 goals 4 behinds; Brown, 2 goals 1 be- ner was sound in ruck, and did useful work also on the half-forward wing. Bridgman was another fellower who performed soundly. and Thicle was solid at centre. Cox (parficularly in the second half), Heath, and Pilsell also did well.

Although, like most of the home team, he faded out of the nicture in the last quarter. Halliday's brilliance in the earlier part of the game won for him first mention among the Gleneig side. He roved untiringly. always being in or near the thickest of the fray, and invariably made excellent use of the ball. Link, also roving and in a forward pocket, did splendidly, especially in the second half, and Johnston performed some excellent work in ruck. Maple and Corbett were other followers who did well, and Hunt, at centre half-forward, was often in the picture. Ahrendt, at full-back, set up a sound defence early in the game, which he main-tained until West Torrens definitely took command, Lush, who hails from Geranium, was outs'anding among G'enelg's many new men On Saturday's came, he appears to be a valuable "find." Although he reached the oval changed in the motor car on the way to the ground, and took the field without having had a rub down, and before he had had an opportunity to meet some of his team-mates-he quickly settled down at full forward and scored four goals. Possessing plenty of weight and height, he has ability to secure the ball himself, without having to rely on being "fed."
