In the roughest game I have seen this season, Torrens settled Sturt's chance of reaching the final four at Unley today. Never have I seen so much kicking at opponents as I saw in this game, and it was remarkable that there were not more injuries.

Umpire Raven allowed far too much latitude, and the players did not fail to take advantage of it.

There were only two serious injuries, one to Dinnison and the other to Rudd—both of which seemed accidents—but there were many players limping on one leg at the close of the game.

From half-time onwards the trainers of both teams were continually on the playing arena, and the most surprising part of it all was that several players were not reported.

The game itself was not a particularly brilliant one, and it was only rarely that any good football was shown by either side.

In fact, the best football was played by Torrens in the latter part of the final term, when Sturt had stopped to a walk.

TOM Warhurst was Norwood's outstanding forward against Glenelg. He was so effective in the second term that after the long interval Glenelg assigned Cornelius, who had been performing splendidly at centre, to quieten him. Cornelius was one of Glenelg's best.

HAROLD Page, Norwood centre half-back, played part of the first term wearing only one boot. The lace of his left boot broke, and while the trainer was adjusting the trouble he played on. Goodwin, Glenelg captain, who was his direct opponent, was playing such fine football that he could not be let loose for a second.

GRIFFITH was always in the limelight for Glenelg at Norwood. Keeping one centre wing open throughout. Another particularly effective man was Keane, centre half-back, who had the better of the duel with Schultz.

OPPOSED to Dinnison, Morton, the double-blue leader, proved too much for the Torrens goalkeeper. Although occasionally he lapsed into inaccuracy, he finished the day with seven goals.

THE match with Norwood will not be forgotten very easily by Pike, Glenelg's fast back. Although he twisted his ankle in the third term, he gamely played on in a forward pocket. To cap his chapter of misfortunes during the afternoon he tried conclusions with the picket fence, and had the worst of the encounter. Even this hard knock, which temporarily stunned him, could not keep him out of the game.

THE full extent of the leg injury to the Glenelg and interstate rover, A. Halliday, will not be known until he is examined and given treatment by a masseur tomorrow. He turned quickly, and then dropped, clutching his leg. The injury was too painful for him to rest his leg on the ground, but officials are hopeful that he will be fit in time for the match with Western Australia, if he is selected.

ONE of the most courageous exhibitions in league football this season was staged by Glenelg's full back, Doug Bell, against Norwood. In the second quarter he twisted his knee, but as Halliday had been forced to retire he would not go off. He marked brilliantly, and saved repeatedly for his team. His leg became so bad that he could not kick properly, but he persisted in hobbling about, still doing effective work.

NORWOOD, after having been worried by Glenelg in the first half, went away in the second and won comfortably. What looked like developing into a hard-fought struggle was spoiled by injury to three men who had been doing good work for Glenelg. Badly handicapped as they were, the tigers put up a game fight and were not disgraced.

Woodrooffe won the toss and chose the northern goal. Setting the redlegs a fast pace, Glenelg bombarded the southern goal, but only five singles came up. Norwood, attacking through Schultz, rattled on goals from Travers and Brown (2).

Halliday broke Glenelg's run of points with a goal from a left-foot snap. Brilliantly intercepting a faulty kick-off by Woodrooffe, Link dashed in for another. A few minutes later Link sent a punt spinning through from 50 yards out, and Goodwin, freed at close range, put on the Bay's fourth goal straight.

SCHULTZ QUIETENED

Within a minute of the start of the second term Norwood equalised the scores with a nice goal from Huxtable, but Glenelg quickly countered with full points from Lush and Goodwin.

For a time Norwood, handicapped by their lack of height in front of goals, could make no impression on the resolute Glenelg defence.

After having been turned repeatedly by Keane, who was defeating Schultz pointless, Norwood staged a brilliant recovery, in which Warhurst kicked three goals and McLean and O'Brien one each.

The tigers were still playing good football, but could not shake the solid Norwood defence. A single from Link a few seconds before half-time was their only score in a quarter of an hour.

Glenelg began the second half with only 16 sound men, Pike (ankle injury) and Bell (twisted knee) being virtually out of action. Cornelius took over at half-back to cheek Warhurst, and Robjent went to centre.

Plunkett, racing into an open goal, snapped full points for Norwood. Lush hit a post with an angle shot, but made amends after a neat mark close in.

GOAL TO WOODROOFFE

The team now staged a goal-for-goal duel, Brown goaling for Norwood, Corbett for Glenelg, Schultz for Norwood, and Lush for the tigers.

Taking a turn on the ball, Woodrooffe, the full back, received from Plunkett and posted Norwood's thirteenth goal with a long drop kick. O'Brien took a beautiful pass from Schultz and goaled.

Five goals in front, Norwood began the 1st term with a winning lead. Lush heartened the tigers with a full-pointer, but Norwood quickly increased their lead with goals from Brown (2), Schultz, and McLean. Robjent broke a lean spell for Glenelg with a long punt which eluded the clutching fingers of the pack and bounced through.

Neat combination between McCallum and Brown, resulting in Brown's sixth goal, was the only highlight of the closing stages of the game.
