Glenelg Have Second Victory KICK ELEVEN GOALS IN LAST QUARTER

North, Norwood Win

Port and Torrens, third and fourth on the league football premiership table, were beaten today by Glenelg and South respectively. Scores:—

A dazzling last term, in which they kicked 11 goals, gave Glenelg their win. It was their second for the season. Shocking play by the Torrens forwards made South's task comparatively easy.

Norwood did not settle down until after half-time, but from then onward were never in doubt against West. North finished too brilliantly for Sturt.

GOALFRONT FAILURE COSTS TORRENS DEAR Equal of South in All Other Departments

The story of Torrens's defeat at the hands of South at the showgrounds today is easily told. Torrens were the equal of South in practically every phase of the game but one—the most important—straight kicking for goal.

In some parts of the ground, particularly across centre and at half-forward, Torrens definitely held the upper hand, but when it came to shooting for goal they were sadly astray.

Their score of 10—25 speaks for itself, but the position was much worse than it actually appears.

Easy shots from straight in front often went astray. Had the blue-and-gold's displayed the same accuracy as their opponents, the result would have been entirely different.

No excuse can be offered for this lapse, as all forward players are expected to be accurate in their kicking.

As a distinct contrast, South were right on the target, and the manner in which they won their goals made the game look easy.

The result cannot materially affect Torrens, but the fact that they must have a reliable set of sharpshooters if they are to win this premiership must have been forced home on them today.

WITH a dazzling last quarter in which they kicked 11 goals Glenelg outclassed Port at Glenelg to win by 28 points. It was their second win for the season. The surprise overthrow of the magpies could not have been done in more spectacular fashion. For three quarters the Bay team fumbled the ball and played raggedly. But in the last term they played like a premiership side, combining well, marking magnificently, and exchanging bump for bump with the rugged Port side.

Port were on top in the first 10 minutes, but shocking kicking for goal wasted their efforts. Of eight shots three went out of bounds and five were points. But the ninth shot by R. Dangerfield started the goal tally.

But his kick missed badly and raised one flag. Lush's shot had a similar result.

R. Dangerfield goaled again for Port and then Eatts raised Glenelg's first goal from a mark.

Port had the best of the term, but established only an eight-point lead. With average shooting they would have been at least four goals in front.

MUCH FUMBLING

In the opening stages of the second term the ball was fumbled for five minutes by both sides in the Glenelg half-forward line. Umpire Allen had no alternative but to order players off the ball.

Winkler and Eatts goaled for the home side to give them a six-point lead. There was no system in either side, but Glenelg seemed to fumble a little more successfully in a game that had been one of the worst this season.

Even Port's usually strong defence faded out and the Glenelg forwards did more or less as they pleased. West was ineffective, and Bampton, on a half-back flank, let Glenelg through several times.

Quinn and Heath scored points for Port, but Glenelg gave them no further chance. Lush, Griffiths, and Winkler goaled in succession without a reply from Port, giving the home side a 24-point lead. Glenelg scored 34 points to Port's two points for the term.

Port began the third term briskly and two points came from a crisp attack. A nice mark by Brock saw Glenelg attacking, and Link raised both flags. For the first time since the early part of the first term, Port asserted themselves, working with the precision of a machine to play all over Glenelg.

Within five minutes Port had four more goals on the board, from Skelly (2), Kellaway and Quinn, thus reducing their deficit to three points.

TABLES TURNED

Hollingworth goaled to give Port the lead again. The quarter had been a repetition of the second term, but with the tables completely turned in Port's favor.

With only six points between the scores both sides started the last term determinedly and Glenelg drew first blood. A long drop by Goodwin went through a crush and the posts untouched, to make the scores even.

Lush, marking beautifully, kicked his third goal for the day, but Heath again equalised scores.

But there was no stopping Glenelg now. Matching Port's vigor and beating them in the air, they moved down the formidable half-back line and brought four goals in succession from Winkler (2), Eatts, and Lush.

GLENELG'S QUICK GOALS

An isolated burst by Port brought a goal from Kellaway, but Glenelg fought back immediately, and a goal from Bailey restored their four-point lead. Within a minute, Bailey goaled again.

This term was as prolific as the prior quarters were unproductive. Ten goals—eight from Glenelg had been scored in about 12 minutes.

Port came with another burst, and put on three goals in a row from Skelley (2), and Quinn. Four times in as many minutes, shots hit the point posts. Port were only eight points behind, and had two of the shots been a few inches more accurate they could have been in front.

Glenelg took the upper hand again and when Lush and Link goaled, the game was beyond doubt. Just before the bell Winkler kicked his fifth for the day and Glenelg's eleventh for the term. Port appeared to tire under its fierce onslaught.

Players Who Were Prominent

LUSH was a model of accuracy for Glenelg when kicking for goal. Two cool, unerring shots in the third term were particularly fine, one having followed a finger-tip mark.

FINE, all-round ability was displayed by H. Tuohy, of Sturt. On the half-back line, he proved more than a match for A. Burton. Tuohy continued to show out in the exciting last quarter when he was switched forward to strengthen the attack.

SOUND anticipation and clever ground play gave Bentley command of the centre at Prospect. He was probably Sturt's most effective player.

ONE of the reasons for Port's burst in the third quarter against Glenelg was a forceful performance by "Bull" Reval. Always in the thick of the fray, he combined weight and speed in the exchanges. His display augurs well for his interstate prospects.

WAITE again played well for Torrens at half-back. He has not played one bad game this season.

SETTING his men a fine example. Goodwin, the Glenelg skipper, did well all day at centre half-forward against Port. He was consistent rather than brilliant.

PAUL Robertson celebrated his hundredth game for Sturt with a splendid performance in defence and on the ball at Prospect. He was always conspicuous. Ralph Green, who is in Melbourne for the kicking competition, would have been playing his hundredth, too.

THERE were no beg pardons about McInnes's play against Sturt. Spelling in Farmer's place at full forward, he alternated with Sid Burton on the ball. McInnes's glasses do not prevent him from giving and taking hard knocks.

SKELLY, who is playing his first season for Port, confirmed his early promise with another impressive display against Glenelg. His roving was of great service to the magpies' packs. He also did some clever sharp-shooting.
