Beaten last week by the bottom team, Sturt today triumphed over the league football leaders, South, It was only the second defeat suffered by the city team this season. Scores:-

Torrens dealt a severe blow to the hopes of North, their principal rivals for major round places, by defeating them by four points in a game of high standard.
