CLOSE-UPS OF PLAYERS

NORTH supporters treasure every goal by Farmer. Although they had a seven-goal lead with five minutes to go, they cheered wildly as the ball which he had kicked off the ground trickled through the goals while a teammate shepherded off a West defender.

HALLIDAY is a real "tiger." No player on the Adelaide Oval today put more energy into his task. Glenelg were too nimble mentally and physically for South in the first three terms, and it was Halliday who set them the example.

THE sight of "Blue" Johnston resting at full forward for Glenelg brought back pleasant memories for Glenelg supporters. He was in that position, with the redoubtable Owens in a pocket when Blue kicked Glenelg's winning goal in the 1934 premiership. Leaping like a kangaroo Johnston was in top form today.

KEANE was a great defender for Glenelg. Time after time he sent South back from centre half-back. It was only a few matches ago that Glenelg secured his clearance from West.

South Scrape Home at Oval STURT BRILLIANT IN THIRD QUARTER Easy Win for North

With Norwood and Port, second and third respectively on the premiership table, beaten and South (top) lagging 14 points at the end of the third quarter, league football followers were provided with thrills in plenty this afternoon. Scores:—

Sturt 14—17 (101 pts.), Port 14—12 (96 pts.).
North 21—21 (147 pts.), West 14—11 (95 pts.).
Torrens 17—16 (118 pts.), Norwood 11—10 (76 pts.).
South 18—11 (119 pts.), Glenelg 15—13 (103 pts.).

After a second quarter burst of brilliant system by Norwood, Torrens were 13 points down at half time. Thereafter with the vigor and pace of Torrens undiminished, the redlegs faded out for their second defeat this year.

Sturt, to all appearances a beaten side at half-time, made a spectacular recovery in the third quarter and were just able to stave off Port in a desperately fought last quarter.

Glenelg, who had not yet won a match, gave South their biggest shock of the season. They led by 14 points at three-quarter time, and with only 17 men, went down fighting when South played like a premiership team for the first time in the last term. North raced away from West after half-time, and won easily.

With 17 Men, Bays Go Down Fighting

Giving South their biggest shock of the season, Glenelg, bottom of the premiership list, pressed the leaders right up to the last five minutes of play at Adelaide Oval, but were beaten by 17 points in a final burst.

Frustrating South's attempts to bring their match-winning system into effect Glenelg showed that they could play football with the best. Had not Hunt broken his collarbone shortly after the start of the last term, leaving the Bay team with 17 men, the result might have been different.

In the early part of the first quarter South looked anything but a premiership side. Teamwork was entirely absent, and in individual play Glenelg had the better of matters.

Goodwin, at centre, gave the Bay team an advantage across centre, while Halliday's leading out from the ruck kept them attacking. From two quick shots, Link raised one-goal-one.

Lapthorne opened South's account with a goal, but for the rest of the term the teams made rally for rally. South's shooting for goal was better, and, although they had one fewer scoring shot, they finished the quarter with a lead of four points.

BAY'S GOALFRONT WEAKNESS

Goals from Winkler and Johnston in the second term gave Glenelg a nine-point lead—an advantage which their share of the play warranted.

Johnston was doing the lion's share in the ruck, while Goodwin, who appeared to be changing from position to position in the forward lines, was outstanding. Bell, at full back, was defending strongly, combining with Currow in a back pocket to clear past centre.

For a time South played as a team in their position on the premiership list should, and took the lead with goals from Hardiman (2), Rosewarne, and Rusby, but Glenelg frustrated their bid to keep the ball high, playing along the ground once they got possession.

Goodwin and Eatts goaled to bring Glenelg within three points. Glenelg had had the best of the first half, but had failed to make full use of their scoring shots.

EFFECTIVE HANDBALL

Faced with defeat by the bottom team, South put their best into the game at the start of the third term, but Glenelg were equally determined.

Within two minutes of the bell Winkler had given his side the lead with a goal, and Link followed with another.

Keane, at centre half-back, turned three South thrusts with beautiful fingertip marks, and, with long, clearing kicks, put Glenelg at the goalfront each time.

When Winkler goaled again, Glenelg had a 16-point lead. Glenelg supporters were wild with excitement. They played with the precision for which South were noted, handballing their way out of crushes and always finding a man in position.

South's first goal for the term—a goal from Rusby—came from an isolated attack, but they followed it

up with three points in succession. When Rusby goaled again, South were only two points behind.

J. P. Dawes in ruck, was the instigator of South's turn for the better, but their superiority was short-lived. Johnston, marking ruggedly, sent Glenelg in again, and goals came from Winkler and Halliday.

J. P. Dawes and Johnston goaled for their respective sides before the bell.

Spectators were shouting half a minute before the ball was bounced for the start of the last term. If South had been slow to start in the other terms, they made amends now. Getting away from the bounce, they had

Glenelg got within firing range, but two strange decisions by umpire Quinn took the advantage from them.

Hardiman goaled for South as a result, giving South a four-point lead, but Winkler put Glenelg in front again with his fifth goal.

South had now established themselves. Brown, Cockburn, and Mulcahy playing a big part in their rehabilitation. Goals from Rosewarne and Templeton gave them a 10-point lead.

But Glenelg fought on tenaciously, and from a series of scrambles in front, two points were rushed before Winkler goaled cleanly.

With 15 minutes to go, South's fine team sense told, but they could not let up for a minute. Hardiman, with two goals clinched the matter, but Glenelg could claim that they had given Souths the biggest shock of the season.
