Sadly lacking a forward of any standing, Sturt failed to make much use of a strong wind early, and it was left to Leak, centreman, and Clark, a wingman to kick goals. Glenelg did well to get two goals from five shots in a tricky wind. Burt, with a fine angle shot, and Lush scoring.

After many attempts, Reynolds marked over Toms, who had been particularly strong, and goaled. Clark got his second, and Langley snapped cleverly to give Sturt a nine-point lead, Kemp having scored for Glenelg.

Both sides battled hard to get goals without much success, and the standard was that of a match with little significance. After Langley had goaled, Halliday, Lush, and Burt added full points, and Glenelg took the lead.

Flying with his old form, "Blue" Johnston kicked two goals quickly, and Kemp got another, putting Glenelg 22 points ahead at half-time.

### TUOHY INJURED

Glenelg continued to dominate the game and goals came from Lush (2) and Abbott. To add to the poor standard of play, rain began to fall.

Sturt's only score in the quarter was five points. Tuohy, whose head was injured, left the field this quarter. He had been playing a good game.

Striving to wipe out a six-goal deficit, Sturt were given a good start by Hardy with full points, but it was a flash in the pan, and Sturt's attack soon died down. Glenelg, however, could do little more than stop Sturt from scoring, and 13 minutes had gone before Lush kicked Glenelg's first goal for the quarter. It was his fifth for the match.

Just before the bell Bentley goaled for Sturt.

## Magarey Medallist Favorites

THE contest for this season's Magarey Medal—the highest possible award for a South Australian footballer—seems more open than for many years.

Taking the players who I consider have a chance, in the order of their teams, I fancy Reval, Greening, and perhaps Schumann have fared best for Port, although it would not surprise me if Quinn polled well, in spite of his long absence from the game.

The most prominent for South have been Cahill, Templeton, Laphorne, Boyle, and Rusby, while of the Norwood men, Warhurst, Sawley, Bice, and possibly Brown have done best.

Torrens' fine pair of rovers, Scott and Juttner, must have obtained many votes, and Waite, too, has been consistently good.

North's best have been Pash, Bennetts, Oatway, and Martin, and Sturt have been well served by Biggs, Morton, Leak, and Langley, the latter having had a particularly fine season.

For West, Powell, McArthur, Cahill, or Broadstock appears the most likely, and Gleneil hopes probably rest in Johnston, Abbott, Hunt, and Goodwin.

It is generally agreed that players of a team which occupies a high position on the premierships list often affect each other's chances.

But this is not always the case. Johnston and Cockburn each won a Magarey Medal in the year that their respective teams won the premierships, and Quinn won the honor for Port when that team played in the grand final.

# Torrens Fail At Alberton

## GLENELG SURPRISE
