

# SOUTH SNATCH VICTORY FROM STURT RIGHT ON BELL

## North Worry Port All Day

### BAYS BEAT TORRENS

OVERWHELMING the more highly favored Torrens team by their shock tactics in the first quarter, Glenelg laid the foundation for a score which enabled them to snatch a one-point victory at Thebarton—their second win for the season.

Glenelg lost the lead just before half-time, but battled on gamely by sheer determination, going again to the front late in the last quarter. In the tense climax, Torrens got to within a point of the winners.

Umpire—L. J. Quinn. Starting with a brilliant burst, Glenelg quickly had Torrens on the defensive. Two goals came from Westley, and Burt followed with a third. Faster to the ball, Glenelg had the measure of the blue-and-golds in all departments, and though Torrens fought back hard, there was no holding the tigers.

Glenelg played like men inspired, and were right on top throughout the quarter. Hunt, before he left the field with a leg injury, put in some great work at centre. He consistently outmarked and outplayed his man. Phillis, at centre half-forward, was also outstanding, and snapped a goal from a long way out.

Down 35 points at the first term, Torrens came with a series of forward thrusts which yielded goals from Sully, Mullins, and Blight quickly.

## Players Who Won a Cheer

BROCK, who usually plays at half-back for Glenelg, did a great job today at half-forward when not following. He is one of the most solid players in the league.

IN Westley and Halliday Glenelg have two of the nippest and most elusive rovers in the league. Both played an important part in the seashiders' brilliant first term against Torrens. Westley, in particular, was the driving power of many Glenelg thrusts.

WHEN Torrens were being badly outplayed by Glenelg in the first term, Scott was one of the few westerners to show out. His scouting and forward work were consistently good. In the second half Juttner came into the limelight in similar roles.

K. P. Hardiman, the Norwood skipper, is proving a valuable substitute for Schultz as a goalgetter. He kicked seven goals today, but if he had been on the target he might have had at least four more. Often he went half-forward looking for leads.

PICKING out his forwards with unerring accuracy, A. G. Sawley played a superb game at centre for Norwood. Although McArthur was an asset for West, he could not cope with him. His brother, G. H. Sawley, was the redleg's outstanding forward.

Torrens' vigorous rally enabled them to get within 13 points of Glenelg, who fought back hard.

The pace was a cracker, with Torrens showing a greater turn of speed and more accuracy in kicking.

They piled up the score steadily, but with a minute to play Glenelg still held the advantage. Hewett marked on the bell and goaled, to give Torrens the lead for the first time.

## Last-Quarter Bid

A goal from Phillis restored the lead to the tigers, but Torrens were determined to prevent a repetition of Glenelg's shock tactics, which had been adopted so successfully in the first quarter.

Hewett, at full forward, scored two singles before he goaled, to give Torrens the lead once more. He did brilliant work in the scrimmages, and was one of Torrens' most useful men.

Glenelg, however, were putting up a stiff resistance. They endeavored to overcome the Torrens mid-field strength by playing to the wings, but the honors for the quarter were divided, with Torrens still in the lead.

Torrens vainly tried to stem the tigers' desperate last quarter bid for victory. However, it was only with about 10 minutes to play that the seashiders hit the front with a full pointer from Bailey. Once again in the lead there was no holding Glenelg. Though Torrens had the ball towards the end of the quarter, they did not break through.

Inaccurate kicking for goal in the last few minutes of play cost Torrens the match. Three singles came and then a goal from Juttner on the bell, but Torrens were still trailing by a point.

C. AAMODT, North centre wingman, was always moving smartly at Alberton. His performance carried more merit, as his opponent was Carmichael, one of Port's best centre wingmen for several years.

TRANSFERRED from centre half-back to T goals because of Boyle's inability to play, Haines did a grand job for South. His performance in keeping Morton down to three goals speaks for itself.

AFTER a sturdy following effort, Jack Dawes covered himself with glory in the closing stages of the game against Sturt. Two splendid marks, backed up by two straight kicks, won the game for South.

PORT had an unfortunate run of injuries in the third term at Alberton. They lost I. Dangerfield, whose work at centre half-back had made him one of his side's best. Then his brother Roy was laid out, and Bob Meers, back pocket, was down on the ground with a leg injury. For several minutes Port played with only 16 men.

C. JOHNSTON (Port) played dashing football when he was used first in attack and then at centre. His leads and clever passes were always worth watching.
