After a brilliant first quarter, in which Burt was outstanding, Glenelg were unable to match North at the Bay. Sturt proved too strong for West at Unley and were able to resist a last-quarter rally. Both won by 17 points.

NORWOOD today looked much more like the redleg team to which South Australian football followers are accustomed, than they have done for Norwood at quarter time.

This quarter was practically all Norwood's, and actually the only one in which they really outscored Torrens.

During this term Norwood played far the better football, and added 6 goals 4 behinds against Torrens' 1 goal 2 behinds, and fur-ther increased their lead to 44 points.

#### Ruck Superiority Vanishes

The ruck strength that Torrens had maintained until half-time completely disap-peared in this quarter, and Norwood took charge practically everywhere. Any promis-ing forward moves by Torrens were quickly stopped by Taylor at centre half-back. West, at half-back left, and Holmesby in the pocket

Sawley was maintaining his pressure at centre, and was the leading light in every Norwood drive.

Combining in fine style with Warhurst, List, or his brother, he frequently found openings in the usually strong Torrens defence, and usually had the pleasure of seeing his efforts rewarded.

At three-quarter time it certainly ap-peared that only a superhuman effort on the part of the Torrens' players was going to get them out of it, but they had given no indication that this was likely, nor was it forthcoming it forthcoming

Torrens made no further alterations in their placings for the last term, although I did think that Filsell's aggressiveness may have offset Sawley's cleverners at centre, but apparently Torrens were satisfied that Sawley was having a real day out, and no one could stop him.

The scoring rate slackened considerably in the last quarter, each team only adding two goals, and long before the final bell was due, all interest had gone from the game, which, although it had begun most promisingly, finished very tamely. There was not a weak point in the Sturt attack, and their effort appeared likely to be a match-winner.

It was largely Powell's brilliant play at full back in the second term which reduced Sturt's advantage. He outmarked and out-manoeuvred the Sturt forwards to clear with long drop-kicks, which gave West every opportunity.

Biggs was Sturt's star, but his vigorous work was mostly wasted when Powell, with strong help from Budarick, cleared from the goalmouth.

### Puzzling Decisions

The decisions of Umpire Hine often ap-peared inconsistent. Players at times showed amazement at them.

West made a desperate third-quarter at-tempt to reduce the big deficit, but without exerting itself, the Sturt defence kept them out.

Leak, at centre, was the home side's handy man. Apart from keeping McArthur quiet, he had a strong influence on the play across centre. Langley, roving and forward pocket, was his side's most energetic man.

West had the better of an unspectacular quarter, adding 3-6 to Sturt's 2-3.

To West had to go credit for a splendid last-quarter rally. Right from the bounce they moved off with a turn of speed which kept Sturt paces behind. Goals came from Langton and Cahill, reducing the deficit to 20 points.
