STURT owe their victory of seven points over Torrens at Unley today to their undoubted superiority in the air. After the first few minutes of play, Torrens were the equal of Sturt, and the Unley team was anything but impressive in a most uninspiring game.

Sturt had first use of a strong wind and quickly got into their stride and took charge. Three goals were rushed in quick time by the double-blues, but from then on the Sturt attack was closely held by the Torrens defence, and it was not until late in the term that Sturt again broke away.

Torrens had much the better of the second term, and but for their wild kicking to positions and much too frequent handball (a fault in evidence by both teams throughout), might have had a useful lead at half-time. During this term Searle played cleverly behind the half-forward line, where his strong marking and kicking and Kent's tigerish roving efforts made many opportunities for Torrens.

But Green's great goalkeeping and Miller's defence in a back pocket were the main reason for Sturt still being in front at half-time.

To me it appeared as though Torrens were instructed to close up the game after half-time, and to counter Sturt's aerial supremacy by keeping the ball low. If these were the instructions, they were certainly carried out, and Sturt, foolishly accepting the challenge to mix it, appeared very haphazard.

The play suffered as a result, and this term was very uninspiring. Sturt could manage only one goal from six attempts. By adding two goals from three tries, Torrens had nullified the wind advantage for Sturt, and had decreased their leeway by a point, making the scores five points in favor of Sturt at the last change.

Sturt further increased their lead by a goal after much hard fighting in the last quarter, and then for a long period there was a battle royal between the opposing backs and forwards with no results. Sturt hung grimly to their slender lead, despite the persistence of Torrens, and the final bell found them seven points in front.

Glenelg, winning in the ruck, looked the better team early in the first quarter, but had difficulty in clinching opportunities at full forward. Wilson, playing the unaccustomed role of goalkeeper, shone for South, while Inglis, who usually played in goal, was rendering Glenelg sterling service in the ruck.

In the second quarter South converted a 13-point deficit into a 13-point lead. During this quarter their ruck revived to dominate the close work, although Brock was battling well for the tigers.

A slight advantage across centre and solid defence gave South forwards many chances, and Doherty and Rusby were using intelligent means of forwarding the ball. After half-time Glenelg put Waite on the ball from full back, and Hender took his place.

Waite's influence was noticed immediately, and after he had gained a quick goal for himself he helped to make matters even with a solid ruck effort.

The tide had turned again, and Glenelg raced away to a nine-point lead, when Pearce, the West Australian, pushed a goal through from close range. By pacing it with the city side, the Bays increased this lead to 15 points at the final change, but South still were masters, and they swarmed in with well-directed kicking to get within Glenelg after a few minutes' play in the last term.

It was exciting football, as the teams battled with seldom more than a goal between them. With only a few minutes left for play the scores drew level, and then Laphorne's fourth goal put South six points in front.

Then Hunt, with a beautiful drop-kick from half-forward, made the scores level again. But South were maintaining their system better under pressure, and goals from Boyle and Pearce clinched the game.
