Playing brilliantly despite the adverse conditions, West overpowered the Sturt defence in the second term, and with their forwards combining well, added sufficient to their tally to make the game safe for them by half-time at Unley today.

With little hingeing on the result of the game and the conditions anything but pleasant for football, the first term was not very interesting.

Centre Line Well on Top

Their centre line was clearly on top, Hudson was predominant at centre half-forward, and Powell and Langton played cleverly further in toward goal.

Chynoweth and Budarick were carrying too many guns for the Sturt ruckmen, and the rovers Coad and Cabill finished off the ruckmen's work in splendid fashion.

During this term West were splendid, and it was only late in the quarter that Sturt made any headway.

Sturt entered the third term full of fight. Playing with plenty of spirit, they evened matters across centre, and Lowe, who had battled hard at half-forward right, now became particularly prominent.

Simon, Jackson, and J. Taylor strove manfully in defence for West, but Sturt were very persistent in their attack.

Backs Stood Firm

They made Lowe the spearhead of most of their attacks, and seriously threatened West. However, West's last line of defence stood firm, and with an advantage of 27 points, and with the ground particularly heavy. West looked certain winners at the last change.

The wind and the rain increased in strength at the opening of the last quarter, and West set about making their position more secure.
