Muddling, miskicking, and mishandling. West-Gleneig made heavy work of the opening phases of the game. They had many opportunities, and the advantage of the stronge breeze, but in the forward area they could do nothing right, the simplest of chances going astray.

Winning across centre, Norwood-North made this a strong defensive line, and it was not until late in the term that Brock opened the goal tally

Port-Torrens won the 1942 league football grand final at Adelaide Oval today after a thrilling battle with West-Glenelg.

THE magpies had to find the best of everything they had to win by 11 points. Undoubtedly their victory was gained through the mastery of their centre line and the high marking powers of their tall men.

Both teams took some time to settle down, but when they did nothing could have been more attractive or faster. Port-Torrens played the ball high to their big men, but had to face up to a well-earned two-goal lead by West-Glenelg, who were combining well.

Roberts' cleverness at centre gave the magpies opportunities which were not wasted. The ball swung from end to end, with great speed, and naturally players were sometimes at fault in their anticipation, but it was spectacular football.

Roberts received great support from his wingmen, and principally through the agency of this trio, Port-Torrens gave the tigers' back men a torrid time, quickly running to a useful lead,

As the term progressed, the magple ruck assumed complete control. Their forwards, co-operating splendidly, were in marked contrast to those of West-Glenelg, whose attack was right off the target with the simplest of shots. When the quarter ended the magples had a lead of 25 points.

Rally by Tigers

Coad, who was again proving one of the tiger's best players, reduced the leeway by six points, and shortly after Brock, from a free right in front, further reduced the deficit with a goal.

West-Glenelg were now challenging the magples' ruck supremacy, and were equalling them in pace, and when Miller goaled with a snapshot, the tigers had added 18 points without Port-Torrens scoring.

Skelley's Great Game

Skelley, playing one of his best games for the season, goaled again for the magpies. Waite, for the second time, took a chance on a short kick in, but again paid the penalty when McLean tore through the goal. He quickly followed with another, his sixth, and the magpies were 20 points in front.

Miller, from a doubtful mark, sent a beautiful punt through, and then was brought to centre in place of Broadstock, who had been unable to cope with Roberts. Broadstock was placed at half-forward left.

The move had instant results, as Milier was instrumental in Taylor getting a goal, which made the difference only eight points. Again Miller figured in a burst, which found Smith unattended almost on the goal-line, and when he kicked truly from a snap. West-Gleneig were four points clear. Franklin reduced it to three at the last change, Undoubtedly the transfer of Miller to centre had been the main reason for the tiger's recovery.

To cap his previous efforts. Coad, for the fourth time, opened the goal scoring as soon as the last term opened. Kelleway pulled down a high one right in front, and had no difficulty in evening up. Then Shaw brought full results, and Port Torrens led again.

The crowd were certainly getting their money's worth. High marking, long kicking, and everything that is good in our game was being shown.

West-Glenelg battered away at the magpies' goal, but Obst, Thiele, and Reval were splendid in defence, and they were rewarded when a burst to the other end brought a goal from Scott.
