

4-Point Victory To Glenelg

In a game in which stamina counted for much, and in which the scores changed often, Glenelg, by a great effort and accurate goalkicking, won from West by four points, at Glenelg Oval today.

MUCH credit for Glenelg's win must go to Burt, who played the loose man to advantage to give his side just that edge required, and that confidence to fight on to the bell.

Players took a long time to settle down to good football. West were first to get the run of a tricky ball, and soon had two goals on the board.

Glenelg, on the other hand, found it hard to get the ball up to their halfward line until combined work by Hauszen and Burt brought up their first major, and gave Glenelg greater confidence.

But West looked the better team, and with O'Donoghue, Burkett, and Mackay holding the centre line, they continued to score more freely than the Bays. Hall and Masters battled determinedly and successfully to push West out time and again.

Hall was playing as well as anyone on the ground, marking with great judgment and picking out a team mate like a veteran.

Hauszen, who has played with such great promise this year, went down with a hard knock, and had to be replaced.

Nevertheless, Glenelg began to fight more fiercely, and with great purpose. A great piece of systematic football saw Edwards find Burt, who made no mistake, and put Glenelg two points ahead for the first time.

FRUITFUL CHANGES

West became ragged, but Taylor tried to pull his side together. Glenelg continued to score with goals from Wroth and Cock, and so West decided to do something about it.

In an effort to strengthen their attack, they sent Burkett to half-forward, and Lee took over at centre.

Results were soon evident, and the scores, showing Glenelg only two points in front at the long interval, were a reliable pointer to the general evenness of the game to that stage.

Although there were glimpses of brilliant football, players were too often content to make half-hearted attempts to gain possession.

McArthur came into prominence, and through fine scouting in front of goals and excellent kicking registered his fourth goal early in the third quarter.

The hard ground was having its effect on the players. Mitchell, with an apparently injured ankle, left the ground. B. Smith received an injured ankle, and went to rest in a forward pocket for West, and Ron Keane, whose reliable defending meant much to Glenelg, also went up forward with a leg injury, but later returned to take over the half-back position.

The lead changed hands several times in the third term, and this closeness more than spectacular play, kept the crowd at a high pitch of interest.

Burt and Austen were trying to make the game easier for Glenelg by opening up the play, but the teams continued in an even tussle.

B. Smith, although resting at full forward, was playing that position well, and sent through three majors in a row to give West a 20-point break, the greatest difference for the match.

GREAT VIGOR SHOWN

In the last term, players threw themselves into the fray with great vigor in an effort to gain or hold what slender lead they had gained.

Cooper and Burt produced a fine effort to put Glenelg four points ahead, to be followed immediately with another goal from Low.

Extremely accurate kicking was a feature of the last quarter. After West had scored three goals, Glenelg took charge and six goals were registered before a single point went to either side.

It was really Glenelg's quarter, but West rallied at the last minute. Their bid failed to reach its objective, and Glenelg won by four points.

It was a worthy effort, and the result represented the even efforts of the two teams.
