Rovers may turn tide for North

Performances over the whole season favor North in the preliminary final. whereas recent form points to Gleneig.

If the goal-to-goal line gives a slight advantage to the Bays, I should say that North are generally stronger on the flanks.

The McKay - Churchett contest—as is the case many individual struggles-is likely to be decided further afield than at the goalfront, with fortune playing its inevitable part.

With North's unfortunate loss of Frank Crouch miraculously balanced by the recovery of Alan Galloway, I still see the match as essentially a battle for the rucks.

In the belief that their roving team is likely to prove superior on this occasion, I choose North.
