

GLENELG FOUGHT BACK WELL

Moonta, Sat.: Down 25 points at quarter-time, Glenelg fought back well to defeat Norwood by eight points in a gruelling game at Moonta Oval today.

Glenelg won because they were a more even side. Their superiority was shown by their 30 scoring shots to 17.

Except for the first quarter and the latter part of the last quarter, Norwood had fewer men dominating the game.

With the Bay rucks shaded, it was left to Glenelg's centre and half-forward lines to create attacking chances.

If Glenelg had lost, they would have had only their shocking kicking from easy positions to blame.

Copy-book game

Aided by a strong breeze, Norwood played copybook football in the first term when they had six goals from eight tries. Glenelg had one goal from eight shots.

With the wind in the second quarter, Glenelg took the initiative from Norwood, and retained it long enough to build a lead sufficient to stave off Norwood's dying effort.

Glenelg's third term set the seal on Norwood's fate. Then, with Don Taylor in brilliant mood at centre half-forward, Glenelg were constantly in attack to kick 3-9 to 1-1 for that period.

Best for Glenelg was Don Taylor, who took up where he left off last week against Victoria, but this time in

an attacking role instead of a defensive one.

Johnny Taylor, although quieter after half-time, was an example to Glenelg when things looked "sick" for them.

Brian Wright, who looks certain to give the State team good service in the future, played the centre half-back position well, after Mayo had given him a hot time at the start.

Wickham acquitted himself well in his arduous task of shadowing Oatey.

Edwards stood out as best man afield. He has fitted snugly into the back pocket position because of Merv Roberts' injury. Edwards' dash and anticipation today were inspiring.

Marriott and Dalwood gave Norwood a ruck advantage. Marriott did a good job by restricting Crabb, while Dalwood's reach and four goals put him high on the honors list.
