

Roberts Saves For Torrens

GLENELG BUMPS WEST TORRENS OFF ITS GAME

By taking the fight to its opponent from the first bounce, Glenelg never allowed West Torrens to settle down in the league football match at Adelaide Oval yesterday.

West Torrens made a strong bid in the third quarter and got to within 11 points of Glenelg, but Glenelg was untroubled to run out the winner by 27 points.

The superiority of the Glenelg rucks and the eclipse of the West Torrens centre line and rovers left it struggling in all but the third quarter.

But for some erratic kicking for goal in the last quarter—two goals from 12 shots—Glenelg would have won by a much bigger margin.

If West Torrens is to become a premiership contender, it will have to either perfect its short-passing game or give the idea away.

Change Of Play

Glenelg quickly hit West Torrens off balance—made easier by lack of retaliation—and always was a yard or two faster. At half-time it led by six goals and looked like going on to an easy win.

West Torrens, which had left itself wide open to the determined, hard-hitting Glenelg players by its erratic short game, immediately after half-time dropped into a long kicking game.

Those tactics paid dividends. It tore down the field to bombard the goal and finished the quarter by kicking 5.8 to 2.1 and placed itself within striking distance of victory.

But those successful tactics were forgotten when the last quarter began and West Torrens reverted to its earlier type of play.

There was a certain disordered individualism about Glenelg's play in the opening game against Port Adelaide, but yesterday it was transformed into a hard-hitting, co-ordinated team which took the pace up to West Torrens and outstripped it.

McPherson (centre wing) made some brilliant and elusive moves and was always shooting the ball goalwards to advantage. He was undoubtedly the best man afield.

Crabb and J. Taylor in the ruck outplayed the opposing followers, with the possible exception of Prior.

Davies in his second league game, outshone Bob Hank at centre in all but the third quarter, and gave promise of great things to come. Others in an even side to do well were Wickham (back pocket), Brooker (rover), Laffin (ruck), Don Taylor (first half at centre half-back), Hunt (goal), Potter (ruck) and Churchett (full forward).

West Torrens had few outstanding players, but Sully (back pocket), Oates (ruck and defence), Pyatt (half-back) and Roberts (goal) played bravely against some tough and determined bombardments.

Prior was the pick of the ruckmen. Bob Hank played a brilliant third quarter, while others to do well were Glastonbury (when shifted to centre half-forward), Bennett (centre half-back), McHaffey (rover) and Bill Hank (defence).

Glenelg rover McDonald, playing in his first league game, was admitted to a private hospital for observation after the game. McDonald walked off the ground at half-time and did not take the field for the third quarter.

The attendance was 17,000.

Sturt were a disgrace to their supporters when they were completely outclassed in a pitiful showing today against North at Unley.

North co-operated well as a team in a consistent display in which they did not show one weak link.

For North, Phillips was best man on the ground with his outstanding play in the four quarters. He topped his performance with six valuable goals, and his position play was outstanding.

H. McKenzie roved with consistent speed and great tenacity. He showed courage and stamina out of proportion to his small size.

Cox, also roving, proved himself a very robust and reliable player, and made a good partner for McKenzie.

Griffen held his wing throughout the day against Kutcher, and caused many forward moves.

Others who did well were McKay, W. McKenzie,

Stringer, and Weston.

For Sturt, Fitzgerald, although not always the brilliant player we know him to be, was definitely the pick of a very mediocre side.

Thompson, who is improving with every game, did a lion's share in the ruck and brought down some very spectacular marks.

Thomas, playing on a centre wing, had the call on his opponent Hancock throughout the game. His position was probably the only winning position for Sturt.

Boland, although up against strong opposition in H. McKenzie and Cox, battled throughout.
