

GLENELG FAIL TO PLAY ON IN SECOND HALF

Glenelg failed badly to finish on in the second half of the football clash against Torrens at Thebarton today, and were beaten by 32 points.

Glenelg had been badly beaten in the first term, when Torrens had the use of the breeze, which later developed into a very strong wind.

The Bays, however, recovered to even matters at half-time.

Coped better

The game was played under really adverse conditions with pools of water on the ground.

It was Torrens' ability to cope with the conditions better which enabled them to win so well.

Skilful football was entirely out of the question, and, as in all such games, the element of luck played a distinct part.

I am not suggesting Torrens had all the luck, but 14 goals 9 behinds, as against 7 goals 19 behinds does help somewhat.

Within a minute Glenelg had the first goal on the board from Churchett after Crabb had sent them goalward with his knock at the centre bounce.

But Torrens answered quickly with a goal from Willis, after Prior had passed to him.

Took charge

Don Taylor and Davies figured early in defence for Glenelg and frequently drove back the Blue-and-Gold attacks.

But from about midway through the quarter Torrens took charge and never let up.

They led by 32 points at the first change, and appeared set for a huge win.

In this term Torrens took 15 marks, Glenelg 16, and were awarded four frees to Glenelg's two.

Big change

A startling change came over the game in the second term, which was a repetition of the first, only in reverse.

After Churchett had got an early goal for Glenelg Willis replied for Torrens, but it was Torrens' only scoring shot for the quarter.

Crabb took sole charge of the packs while he was in ruck. Mainly through his grand work, Glenelg got the upper hand.

The wind, which had increased in strength, played

havoc with the white ball being used, and Torrens' defending kicks went everywhere.

Actually, on the play Glenelg should have had a handy lead at half-time instead of trailing one point.

They had plenty of chances, but their goal-shooting let them down badly, only four goals coming from 17 scoring-hots in this term.

Marks for second quarter: Torrens 8, Glenelg 12.

Frees given: Torrens 5, Glenelg 6.

Churchett repeated his first quarter's performance by goaling within a minute of the bounce at the start of the third term.

The wind was now blowing straight down the ground in Torrens' favor.

Davies and Taylor again gave grand service for Glenelg in defence in the first 15 minutes of play and Torrens could make no headway.

Hall's goal from a free for Glenelg was invaluable. They led 5 points with much more than half the term gone.

But Don Prior's return to the ruck was a signal for Torrens to unleash their power.

Prior did not subdue Crabb, but he greatly lessened the Bay man's power and Torrens went forward.

Strangely enough, it was a badly directed kick from Crabb that first let Torrens in with a goal from Head.

And in a few minutes, Torrens had added four goals to race away to a 19-point lead, which was taken to 23 at three-quarter time.

They had put on four goals five behinds to Glenelg's one goal one behind, but even that did not appear too much in view of the wind.

In the third quarter Torrens took 16 marks, Glenelg 19; and received five frees to Glenelg's five.

Don Taylor was at centre for Glenelg in the last quarter, Alf Bailey at half-forward left, and Wickham at half-back left.

Torrens went farther ahead in the face of the wind, Head being particularly effective in attack.

With victory within their

grasp, Torrens finished very strongly. Still kicking accurately, they added 3 goals to Glenelg's 1 goal 3 behinds to win going away.

In the last term Torrens took 15 marks, Glenelg 10, and were awarded 6 frees to Glenelg's 4. For the match Torrens took 54 marks and Glenelg 57. Torrens received 20 frees and Glenelg 17.

Prior gets my vote as Torrens' best. The tall ruckman rarely wasted anything, and I think he was the prime starter of Torrens' matchwinning break in the third quarter.

Ashly did a fine job at centre half-back; Head, particularly in the second half, was always on the job. Clingly again was very strong in defence, and Carr was well under notice at centre wing.

Crabb, I think, was the best on the ground. The Glenelg follower hardly put a foot wrong, whether following or in attack.

Davies was safe and sure at centre half-back. King, suited by the conditions, put plenty of fire into his roving.

Don Taylor at half-back left, and later at centre, was always prominent, and Wickham did a serviceable job for his side.
