

# Bays convincing in defeating Sturt

Glenelg continued their unbeaten run by another convincing win, their third in succession, against Sturt at the Unley Oval today.

The victory was all the more creditable because of the last-minute withdrawal of the Bays' captain-coach, Pat Hall, with an infected foot.

Glenelg swamped the Blues in a tear-away first quarter, but Sturt, playing real football, kicked six successive goals in the second term.

Their tally, by contrast had been six points in a row in the first half-hour of play.

Just when the Unley men threatened real danger by levelling the scores more than half-way through the third quarter the Tigers spurted away again, and never looked back.

The Bays' play, except when Sturt threw out their strongest challenge, was fast and purposeful, with sharp thrusts and classy footpassing as highlights.

## Go-through tactics

In Hall's absence Alan Wright was chosen as a ruck replacement. He scored the Bays' first goal of the match.

Glenelg's speed and position-play gave them a 32-point lead at the first changeover. Their go-through tactics brought dividends in a big way, and Sturt were hard pressed to keep them from racing even further ahead.

The Tigers combined with smooth precision, and did not let their rivals get really going until the second term.

One reason for Sturt's rally was the switching of Rattigan from the role of goalkeeper to that of follower. He inspired many determined drives, and the Bays soon found their comfortable lead slipping away from them.

Continuing their vigorous work after half-time, Sturt at one stage looked like unsettling Glenelg, with a chance of snatching the lead for the first time.

## 3 quick goals

But Don Taylor, shifted from half-back to centre, shaped much better in his new position, and three quick goals saved the day before the last interval. Glenelg regained their earlier sureness, and the Blues lapsed once more into fumbling ground play.

Plenty of vigor was instilled into the game by both teams, but Sturt supporters did not see the exciting finish they wanted.

Glenelg had had their shock, and they were grimly determined not to be caught napping again.

Colin Churchett, comparatively quiet in the first half, came into the picture with three goals in the final term.

It was nearly a repetition of the one-sided first quarter, and suggested that soon other teams will find Glenelg an equally tough nut to crack.

Although Neale Davies, at half-forward, marred

his sharpshooting a little with four points near the end of the game, I still think he was Glenelg's most consistent player.

He was always in the thick of the fray, fast and ready to make new openings for his side.

In the first quarter, it was due entirely to his efforts that goals went to the credit of his teammates.

Alan Crabb, quiet in the first two games this season, returned to form today. It was well-timed because of Pat Hall's absence, and prevented Sturt from gaining ruck ascendancy.

Colin Churchett, with five goals, kept the attack going smoothly in spite of strong opposition. Of the others Guy, King, Don Taylor, and Bone were the pick for useful performances.
